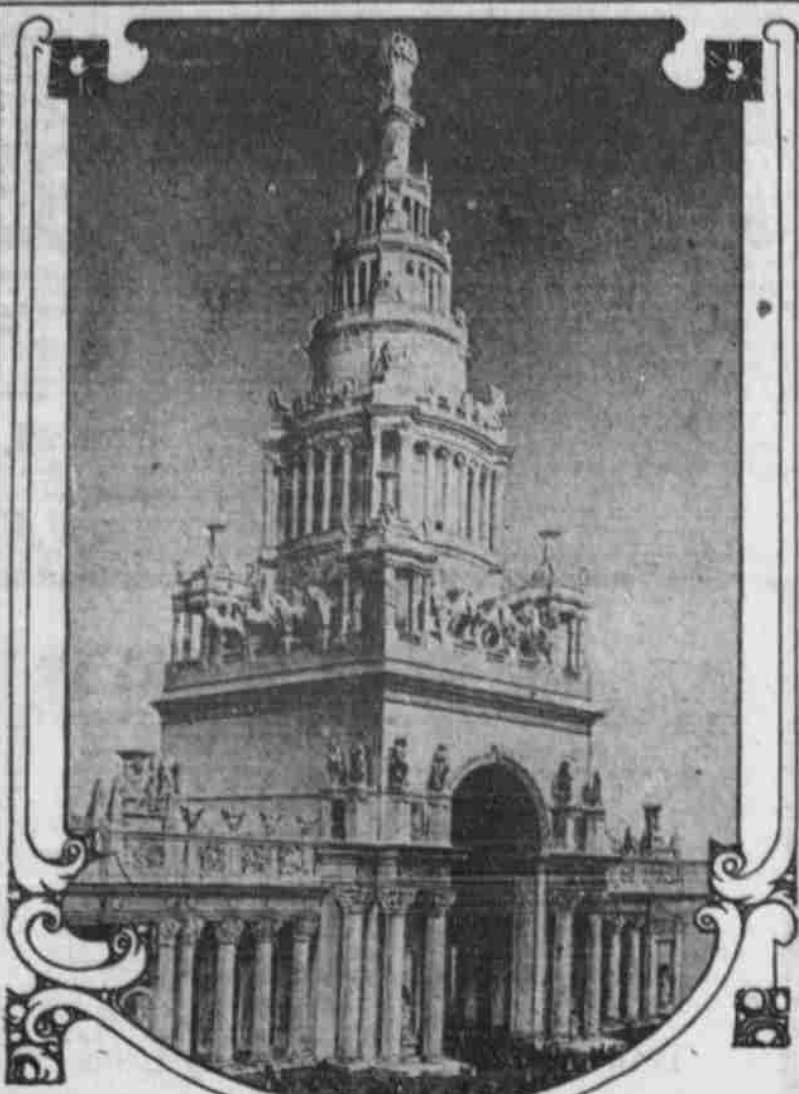

A MARVELOUS SETTING FOR SCULPTURE AT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION, 1915.

THE dominating architectural feature of the exposition, the superb Tower of Jewels, which will command the south entrance of the Court of Sun and Stars at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition in San Francisco in 1915. This tower, 430 feet in height, will have a base one acre in extent. The tower will rise upward in terraces, giving way at last to a group of figures supporting a globe, typifying the world. The repeated figures of armored horsemen and of explorers of the ocean will be used on the tower, which, with its statuary, mural paintings and mosaics, will be indescribably beautiful. Messrs. Carrere & Hastings, architects in chief of the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo in 1901, are the architects.

BIG NEW YEAR'S DANCE.

Improve character tends to religion."

The morals of the town was the subject of the talk of C. S. Benson and he reiterated the remarks of the preceding speakers that the average of public and private morality in

Bend compares well with that of any town. The chief defect he pointed out is apathy—the feeling of no necessity for aggressive work. This he declared, is dangerous. Mr. Benson then spoke on religion and the church as the greatest producers of character.

R. W. Sawyer of The Bulletin and Rev. E. G. Judd followed Mr. Benson, with suggestion as to their ideas of what the town needed, and Rev. K. C. Newham also spoke briefly along similar lines, before Dr. Bulgin was introduced for the concluding remarks.

The evangelist spoke forcefully, urging that the only manner in which a town could reach true greatness was by following the principles of Christianity. He was especially bitter as to the liquor business and as to what he said he understood to be a condition here of cliques who were always fighting each other.

At the conclusion of Mr. Bulgin's remarks Mr. Hudson made a spirited reply, asserting that Dr. Bulgin had misrepresented his remarks on the liquor business and calling on him to state exactly what he meant as to cliques in the town. On this point the preacher said that he had been speaking from hearsay only. Mr. Hudson repeated his views on the liquor question and denied the existence of cliques as alleged, after which the meeting broke up in some confusion.

Meetings in Smith Building. Beginning on Thursday night, the revival meetings were held in the Smith building, a platform for the speaker and the choir having been built in the rear and wooden benches put in for the audience. Large numbers of people have been in attendance regularly. The following statement of the results of the meetings to date is contributed by one of the local ministers:

The union meetings now in progress are the most stirring and far reaching that have ever been held in Bend. The organization which is conducted under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Rose is comprehensive, complete and commendable. A building could not be obtained or constructed that would be better adapted for this purpose than the Smith building, which while so commodious has already been filled. The large choir has contributed attractive music at each service, while the solos and duets of Mr. and Mrs. Rose are of a unique character. The latter are pronounced as of the highest order, powerful, finished and persuasive. The audiences that have gathered night after night in spite of such unfavorable climatic conditions attest the interest that is being taken by the public in the sermons of Dr. Bulgin. With much travel and wide experience, the evangelist has gathered illustrative matter that appeals to every emotion and that arouses immediate interest from his powerful personality.

Dr. Bulgin has his own way of preaching great doctrinal sermons that are logical, forceful and full of interest. The highest principles of Christianity are being laid deep and dominant in the hearts of men hith-

erto indifferent to the things that are spiritual and supreme. His teachings are discussed at every street corner and in every home and the results are already manifest by the serious attention that is being paid by all classes to the great and hitherto neglected moral interests of our town.

By the cordial and complete cooperation of all the Christian people in Bend and by forgetting personal preferences and giving these meetings the time and prayerful interest they morally demand, we cannot but believe that the moral and spiritual forces of this community shall receive an impetus and success that has been unrealized in the past.

NEW COLLECTOR OF TAXES

By Provisions of Law Effective January 1, County Treasurer Handles Funds.

In Crook county, as elsewhere throughout Oregon, the county treasurer on January 1 succeeded the sheriff as collector of all taxes except those delinquent. It is still the duty of the sheriff to garner in this part of the funds of the county.

The following are the most important features of the law now in effect: No rebate will be paid on any taxes. Three per cent formerly was

allowed if paid before March 1. All taxes are due and payable on April 1. They are not delinquent until September 1, but penalties of 1 per cent a month are imposed on unpaid portions.

On last one-half payment, delinquent September 1, penalty of 12 per cent is charged, also interest at 12 per cent per annum from date of delinquency.

Certificates of delinquency, bearing interest at the rate of 15 per cent, per annum, shall be issued one month after delinquency. Formerly six months were allowed.

Old delinquency charge of 10 per cent for failure to pay taxes by the first Monday in April is eliminated.
