

466 PERMITS GIVEN IN 1913

REPORT ON APPROPRIATION OF WATER

State Engineer Issues Statement For Past Year—During Quarter Ending December 31, Dozen Permits Given to Water Applicants.

SALEM, Jan. 19.—For the year 1913, a total of 466 permits were issued by the state engineer for the appropriation of water. Under these permits 442,181 acres will be irrigated, \$9,225 horsepower will be developed and 41 reservoirs constructed at a total cost of approximately \$7,000,000.

During the quarter ending December 31, 1913, 88 permits were issued for the irrigation of 6,933 acres and the development of 1588 horsepower. Among these permits was one issued to F. D. Small of Tillamook and D. C. Urie, of Camas, Wash., for the development of 1298 horsepower with the waters of the Trask river in Tillamook county.

The following are permits issued in Crook county the past quarter:

Edgar Laughlin of Paulina has two permits; one diverts the water from Mud Springs in section 35, township 15, South, range 24 E, for the irrigation of 20 acres and the other diverts the water from Beaver Creek in section 19, township 16, South, range 25 East, for the irrigation of 280 acres. N. Longenbaugh of Prineville diverts the flood waters in section 15, township 14 S, range 15 E for the irrigation of 5 acres with the waters diverted from two springs located in township 18 S, range 17 E and the other for the irrigation of 100 acres with the waters of Little Bear Creek diverted in section 22, township 18 S, range 17 E. Chas. Cochran of Meadow for domestic supply and the irrigation of 80 acres with the waters of Indian creek, diverted in section 31, township 13 S, range 21 E. C. T. Hubbard of Grandview, for the irrigation of 10 acres with the waters of Metolius creek, diverted in section 34, township 10, S range 10 E. A. Brundage of Culver, for domestic supply, with the waters of Crooked river, in section 14, township 12 S, range 12 E. A. E. McClellan of Shaniko, for the irrigation of 6 acres with the waters of a spring which is located in section 11, township 8, S, range 14 E. J. T. McClellan of Shaniko, for domestic use. David Milburn of Lower Bridge, for the irrigation of 43 acres with the waters of Squaw creek, diverted in section 6, township 14 S, range 12 E. M. D. Nye of Roberts for the irrigation of 8 acres with the waters of Little Bear creek, diverted in section 5, township 18 S, range 18 E.

CITY OF RAPID GROWTH

Substantial Improvements in Bend Noted By Portland Writer.

In Sunday's Portland Journal appeared the following article, written by A. D. Cridge, traveling representative of that newspaper:

BEND, ORE., Jan. 17.—The City of Bend in the last two years has built 400 residences and increased from 500 people to over 2500. In the last year there have been erected six large, substantial and modern buildings in which are some 15 stores on the ground floors.

Much pride is taken in the completion of the new sewer system costing \$70000, and in the construction of the new school house to cost \$25000. The grading of the streets, installation of cluster lights and the laying of good sidewalks are other matters of pride.

One of the peculiar industries of Bend is the ice harvest. From ponds and backwater the natural ice is gathered, the pure water of the Deschutes being unexcelled for quality of ice. One firm has its sheds ready for 200 tons this winter, and while the season has not been particularly good from the ice man's standpoint, there will be that much secured without trouble.

Considerable interest is being taken among grain farmers in this section in the development of summer fallow land by the planting of beans. It is said that summer fallow land in Central Oregon has returned \$18 an acre profit. The beans are said to cost \$6 an acre to cultivate, and thereby weeds are kept down for the next season's grain. There will be considerable summer fallow to beans next spring on dry land summer fallow if the season is what is called in Central Oregon a "wet" one.

The building stone to be found in quantities within reach of Bend will some day be utilized instead of lumber for farm buildings and city residences. It has been demonstrated to be cheaper in the long run, but the people are still in the pioneer stage, lumber is cheap, and to look ahead 40 years in putting in a residence is

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too long a vista for most of them, to say nothing of building a stone house to last for centuries.

EXHIBIT OF HOME PRODUCTS

Statewide Campaign Planned in Interests of Oregon Manufacturers.

A state-wide campaign in the interests of Oregon manufactured products will be conducted soon from special cars which will visit almost all the cities having a population of 400 or more. One or two cars will be filled with exhibits of products made in Oregon. The exhibit will remain from a half day to two days in all the cities with a population of 400 or more on the lines of the Southern Pacific and O.-W. R. & N. The territory to be covered will extend as far south as Ashland and eastward to Baker City.

Addresses and an elaborate catalogue will be prepared, describing the exhibition and the need of patronizing home industries. The catalogue will contain prices of the products. A list of visitors to the exhibition cars will be given to the exhibiting manufacturers.
