
State Engineer Issues Statement For Past Year-During Quarter Ending December 31, Dozen Permits Given to Water Applicants.

During the quarter ending December 31, 1913, 88 permits were issued for the irrigation of 6,933 acres and the development of 1958 horsepower, Among these permits was one issued to F. D. Small of Tillamook and D. C. Urie, of Camas, Wash., for the development of 1208 horsepower with the waters of the Trask river in Tillamook county,

CITY OF RAPID GROWTH Substantial Improvements in Bend

Noted By Portland Writer, In Sunday's Portland Journal appeared the following article, written by A. D. Cridge, traveling represen-

tative of that newspaper: BEND, ORE., Jan. 17.-The City of Bend in the last two years has of Bend in the last two years has built 400 residences and increased from 500 people to over 2500. In the last year there have been erected six large, substantial and modern buildings in which are some 15 stores on the ground floors. Much pride is taken in the comple-tion of the new sewer system costing \$70000, and in the construction of the new school house to cost \$25000. The grading of the streets, installa-

The grading of the streets, installa-tion of cluster lights and the laying

tion of cluster lights and the laying of good sidewalks are other matters of pride. One of the peculiar industries of Bend is the ice harvest. From ponds and backwater the natural ice is gathered, the pure water of the De-schutes being unexcelled for quality of ice. One firm has its sheds ready for 200 tons this winter and while of ice. One firm has its sneds ready for 200 tons this winter, and while the season has not been particularly good from the ice man's standpoint, there will be that much secured without trouble.

Considerable interest is being taken among grain farmers in this sec-tion in the development of summer fallow land by the planting of beans. It is said that summer fallow land in It is said that summer fallow land in Central Oregon has returned \$18 an acre profit. The beans are said to cost \$6 an acre to cultivate, and thereby weeds are kept down for the next season's grain. There will be considerable summer fallow to beans next spring on dry land summer fal-low if the season is what is called in Central Oregon a "wet" one.
