

NO DAMAGE BY STORM HERE

HIGH WIND ON SUNDAY NIGHT

Fall of Foot of Snow Saturday Brings Joy to Farmers—Precipitation Has Amounted To Two Inches This Month—Days are Sunny.

The storms which have swept over Oregon and Washington the past week were felt but little in Central Oregon, and no damage of consequence was done. Bend was visited Sunday night by a wind which old timers say was the highest ever known here, but aside from a loss of sleep to many people there was practically no harm done.

The telephone company, and indirectly telephone users, suffered the most. The big pine tree at the corner of Bond and Ohio streets was blown down, breaking a number of wires. The May apartment barely escaped being damaged, the top of the tree missing the building only a foot or two. It was a close enough call to give the occupants a shiver of fright. The old unused flume which crossed the river at the Bend Company's bridge tumbled down and took down the telephone line to the mill, while a few business signs were blown down.

Early Saturday morning there was a big snowstorm which lasted until about 10 o'clock, and in six or eight hours there was a fall of nearly a foot of snow. Nearly every night since then there has been from a quarter to an inch of snow, but the days have been warm and much of it has melted and gone into the ground, to the special delight of the farmers and the gratification of all who are interested in the raising of good crops the coming summer. Since the first of the year there have been two inches of precipitation at Bend, with a greater or less amount all over the Central Oregon country.

DRY LAND ALFALFA

Hill Railway Line Distributing Seed to Farmers.

Farming in Central Oregon is this year receiving more encouragement than ever before from the railroad systems, who are assisting in a practical way. As The Bulletin has previously noted, the O.-W. R. & N. is distributing seed corn to all who apply for it. Along the same line the Oregon Trunk or Hill system is endeavoring to have the farmers make practical demonstrations of alfalfa on dry land. This hay crop has proved to be so successful on irrigated tracts that it is believed that it can be made a good money-producer on the extensive non-irrigated areas of Central Oregon.

The road has secured the names of reliable farmers throughout this territory and is furnishing each one who wishes seed enough to plant an acre.
