The May apartment barely escaped being damaged, the top of the tree missing the building only a foot or two. It was a close enough call to give the occupants a shiver of fright. The old unused flume which crossed the river at the Bend Company's bridge tumbled down and took down the talephone line to the mill, while a few business signs were

a big snowstorm which lasted until
about 10 o'clock, and in six or eight about 10 o'clock, and in six or eight hours there was a fall of nearly a foot of snow. Nearly every night since then there has been from a quarter to an inch of snow, but the days have been warm and much of it has melted and gone into the ground to the special delight of the farmers and the gratification of all who are interested in the raising of good. interested in the raising of good crops the coming summer. Since the first of the year there have been two inches of precipitation at Bend, with a greater or less amount all over the Central Oregon country.
