NEW ACCOUNTING SYSTEM.

A new uniform system of book-keeping for all state and county offices has been inaugurated in Oregon. The last Legislature created a new law providing for the system of accounting and the state insurance commissioner was empowered to prepare ledgers, blanks, forms, etc., for its use, having until January 1 to complete this work and get the system started over the state. The system will cause considerable more work in all the offices and the supplies necessary for its inauguration require considerable expense by the county.
