

TALKS ON IRRIGATION

J. T. Hinkle Addresses Gathering At Dream Theatre.

J. T. Hinkle of Hermiston, Ore., secretary last year of the Oregon Irrigation Congress, addressed a gathering of business men and farmers at the Dream Theatre last Wednesday evening.

Although the meeting had not been extensively advertised, several dozen farmers were in and listened with interest to Mr. Hinkle's remarks. He spoke on the general theme of irrigation, pointing out the various methods by which irrigation work can be undertaken.

Following his address, which lasted about an hour, there was an informal discussion of the subject by farmers and others.

Mr. Hinkle's visit here concluded a trip to Central Oregon on which he addressed gatherings at Madras, Culver, and other points.

LAND APPLICATIONS ALLOWED.

The local forest office has been notified that two tracts of land in township 22 south, range 8 east, have been listed for entry. There are 39 acres in sec. 12 applied for by W. L. Childers of Gold Hill, Ore., May 20, 1912, and 59 acres in the same section applied for by Gen. Fols of Portland September 25, 1913.

NO PREFERENCE TO BE SHOWN.

The Department of the Interior is sending out notices to persons who have applied for homesteads in the Deschutes and Paulina National Forests informing them that they will be given no preference rights of filing when this land is eliminated from the forests, on account of these applications. Recently since it became known that the lands were to be eliminated, there have been many of these applications, the persons applying probably thinking they would be given the first chance to file on the tracts for which they applied.

CONSIDERING ICE PLANT.

A. E. Edwards of Seattle, representing a Pennsylvania ice machine company, was in town yesterday for the purpose of placing before the officials of the Bend Water & Light Company information regarding his company's machinery. The local company is considering the installation of an ice plant and at the present time is gathering data on the subject.

O'DONNELL BUYS TRUCK.

O'Donnell Bros. last week received a brand new auto truck which they will use in delivering meats to the Tumalo Project and in handling butchered stock. The truck is a Willys-Overland and has a carrying capacity of one ton. This makes the third truck in use by Bend merchants.

MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, Feb. 20.—Receipts for the week have been: cattle 1634, calves 4, hogs 5702, sheep 5249.

A big week on the cattle market, particularly the first half. Offerings of butcher cattle, cows, heifers, etc., were extremely short of trade needs compared with steer consignments. The best quality grain fed bullocks sold at \$7.50 to \$8.00 and cows \$6.75 to \$7.00. Bull trade was

slow, but calves ruled firm. After Monday receipts were not as heavy as expected. Hogs were the real sensation of the period as they opened up on Monday at \$8.65 and got to \$8.75 by Wednesday in the face of a deluge. The bulge was not a spasm either as it maintained a firm front right up to the close of the week. Haying of swine was spirited and competition among the killers to get stock of any weight so long as it had a smooth finish produced a real live market. Lamb transactions carried off the honors in the sheep house. Several lots of medium grade ones went over the scales, and a bunch of yearlings at \$6.00 comprised the bulk of mutton sale. The best grain lambs sold at \$6.75, the first shorn stock of the season arrived this week.
