MCKAY SAYS YARN FALSE

La Pine Paper Accuses Game Authorities of Butchery.

In its Crescent correspondence the La Pine Inter-Mountain prints the following paragraph:
"Advice received at Crescent from the Davis Lake country Monday are to the effect that at a recent visit of representatives of the State Game Warden's office, a needless slaughter of game was carried out. Seven deer were killed, four of which were not even skinned and only the hams removed for meat, the rest of the carcasses being left for the coyotes. Besides these, large numbers of ducks and grouse were killed. This information has been forwarded to State Game Warden Finley."
Clyde McKay of Bend, deputy game warden, was with the party which the La Pine paper purports to "show up." Mr. McKay brands the yarn utterly false, stating emphatically that but three deer were killed, that all were preserved, and that in no way was there needless destruction of game. All the meat killed was given to those who assisted in packing.
