

FEBRUARY WEATHER

Month Showed Steady Advance Toward Spring.

While other parts of the country have been contending with floods, as in southern California, and with below zero weather, as on the Atlantic coast, Central Oregon weather continued in its customary moderate path during the month of February.

The winds and rain of January were succeeded in the first of the month by a few clear, cold days, the mercury showing a minimum registry of 19 on the 2nd but there has been a steady and gradual rise since then until the last few days of the month have been truly like spring.

The precipitation records for the month show a total fall of one fourth inches, most of this fell in the night at different times through the month though on the 19th there was considerable rain in the day time. Snow to the amount of one fourth inches fell, there being two light storms on the 17th and the 18th.

For the whole month the mean maximum temperature was 43.3 degrees and the mean minimum 29.9 degrees, giving a mean for the month of 36.6 degrees.
