

TUMALO WORK IN FULL SWING

CAMP AT DAM TO BE A SMALL TOWN

Men at Work There Now Number
140—Equipment is Purchased—
Laying Steel Flume and Begin-
ning on Distribution System.

With the coming of the spring weather work on the Tumalo project has opened up and is now in full swing. At present three camps are running, according to Chief Clerk Ross, who was in town Saturday afternoon, and one of them, Camp 6, will be a regular town with a bigger population than has Laidlaw itself. This is the camp at the dam site where 140 men are employed now. There will be a number of men with families there. For the accommodation of the others a dining room has just been completed to hold 175.

At this point at the present time the work consists of stripping away the soil and tearing away the rock for the core wall of the dam. Six wheel scrapers and a screening outfit have recently been bought from the C. O. I. Co. for use here and on Friday Mr. Laugegard went to Portland to select and purchase additional outfits for the work. He was accompanied by Axel Bye who recently returned to the work after spending the winter in Norway.

Another big camp will be No. 7 which has just been started up. At present 25 men are employed from this camp which is the first to begin work on the distributing system. It is located on the A. F. Will property 5 miles north of Laidlaw.

Camp 4 with about 20 men started last Saturday. They are finishing a small cut in the canal on which Adams had a contract last year, and having a much easier time at it, because the rains have so softened the formation that it is possible to remove the rock, or hardpan, with scrapers. Last summer at this point it was necessary to use powder to loosen the rock.

The steel flume has been laid in Tewksbury canyon and is in process of erection on the other portions of the canal. In a week or two more this portion of the work will be finished and only the dam and the distributing system will remain.

MORE LANDS OPENED BY GOVERNMENT UNDER THE 320-ACRE HOMESTEAD ACT

Official notice has been received in Bend of the opening of a large list of additional land under the enlarged homestead act (320 acres.) All this land is in The Dalles district. It should not be confused in any way with the proposed elimination of lands in the Deschutes and Paulina forests, as one can see by reference to a map that none of it is in either of these forests. Most of the tracts are in the northern part of Central Oregon, with a few lying in the eastern part of Crook county. The areas became enterable in 320 acre claims on March 9. "In so far as they are vacant, public, not timbered and non-mineral and unaffected by any special provision of law, withdrawal or reservation inconsistent with the provisions of said [enlarged homestead] act. No rights are gained by the filing of applications prior to March 9, 1914."

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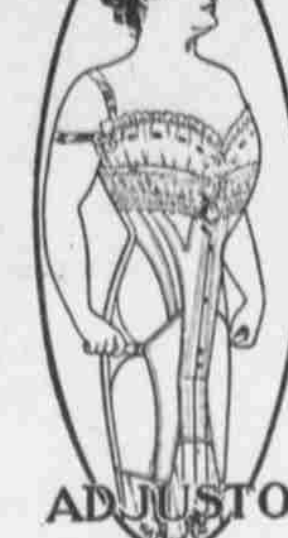
