PARTRIDGES ARE KILLED
Dogs Get Birds That are Not Yet Able to Fly.
The China pheasants and Hungarian partridges that were set free on the 14th are apparently doing well so far as weather conditions are concerned and there is no evidence that hunters are molesting them, but several of the partridges have been found dead recently, and it is believed that fishermen are responsible. A member of the Rod and Gun Club who has taken considerable interest in the birds makes the paradoxical statement, agreeing however, that the fishermen are not knowingly or intentionally guilty of injuring the birds.
As he explains it the birds that have been found dead were all killed by dogs. He believes that they were dogs who were out with their owners while the latter were fishing and in ranging over the country they came on the partridges, who are as yet unable to fly, because of wing soreness brought on by being boxed for shipment. He urges that all dog owners make it a point to leave their dogs at home when they go out fishing.

NEW WORK ON SWALLEY DITCH
Company Will Spend \$2500 At Once For Ditch Enlargement.
Much development work was authorized at a meeting of the Swalley Ditch Company stockholders Saturday, at a cost of approximately \$2500. The ditch will handle 125 second feet at the intake, and will provide for 10,000 acres of land, about half of which is now in cultivation, all of it within ten miles north of town.
Adam Kotsman was elected manager of the work for this season. An assessment of fifty cents a share was levied. Work will commence Monday.
