

CANALS BEING REPAIRED

C. O. I. Co. Has Many Men At Work. Water on Next Week.

Preparing for the opening of the irrigation season the Central Oregon Irrigation Company is now employing about 100 men and 50 teams on the Central Oregon and Pilot Butte canals doing more repair work than in any previous year.

As yet little has been done by the Reclamation Service in the investigation of the North Canal unit. An engineer of the service was in a short time ago and spent a few days in going over the ground, but since then nothing has been done.

GOVERNOR CHARGES FRAUD

Executive Would Recover Land Held By Pacific Livestock Company.

SALEM, March 23.—Alleging that the original purchasers acquired the land through fraud, Governor West today furnished Attorney General Crawford a statement regarding methods with which the Pacific Livestock Company obtained the title to about 27,000 acres of state school, swamp and identity lands in Harney county.

He asked the Attorney General to recover the land for the state.

Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Yates were Prineville visitors Friday.

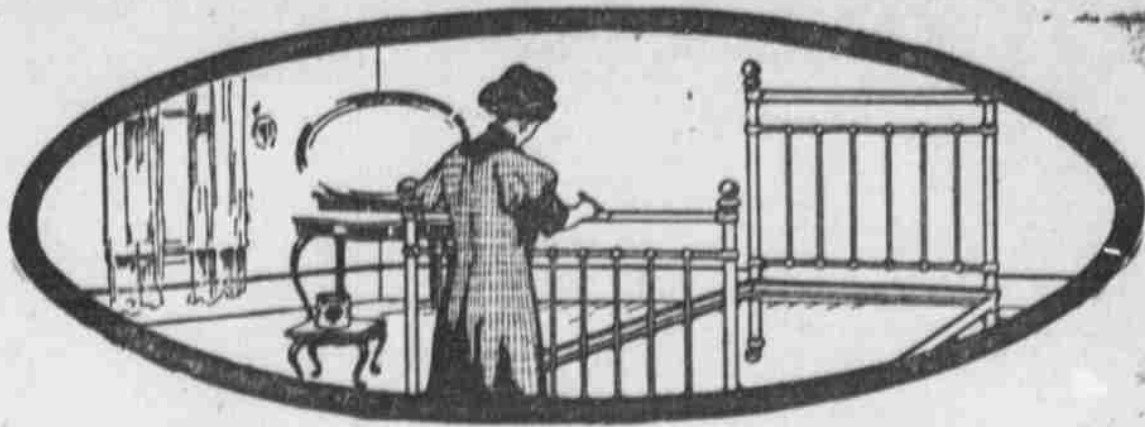

C. M. Charlton returned Friday from a visit with the family in Prineville, Miss Ina accompanied her father.



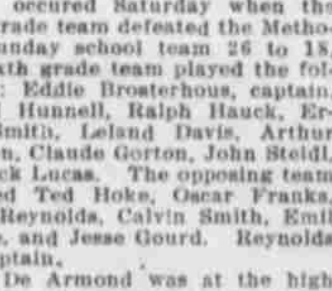
