

ANNOUNCE RULES OF SETTLEMENT

Description of Tracts Open to Settlement in Deschutes and Paulina Forests is Sent Out-Prospective Settlers Already Here.

Although the opening of the Deschutes and Paulina lands is still six weeks away forerunners of the expected body of settlers are arriving and making their preparations to take up lands when the time comes. that the lands will be open for set-tlement under the homestead laws at 9 a. m. on May 9, 1914, and to entry on June 8. The statement from The Dalles says further that "no persons who go upon any of the lands and perform any act of settlement there-on from and including the date of the President's Proclamation until 9 o'clock a. m., May 9, 1914, or who are on or occupying any part of such lands at said hour, except those hav-ing valid subsisting settlement rights initiated prior to reservation and since maintained, will be considered and dealt with as trespassers and preference will be given the prior legal applicant, notwithstanding such unlawful settlement or occupancy Provided, however, that nothing herein shall prevent persons from going upon and over the lands to examine them with a view of thereaf-ter going upon and making settlement thereon when the lands shall become subject thereto in accordance with this order. Persons having prior settlement rights, as above defined, will be allowed to make entry in conformity with existing law and regulations.

Some Lands Withdrawn.

Of the lands eliminated from the forests as shown above, large tracts have been withdrawn from entry in connection with reclamation investigations now being carried on. The largest of these covers much of the land along the river in the Deschutes forest which is withdrawn in connec-tion with the Benham Falls project and survey. In addition, according to word received in Bend this week, about two thirds of the eliminated trea near Crescent has been re-withdrawn for reclamation purposes. Verification of this last statement has not yet been received.
