COMMERCIAL STOCK FEEDS

Dairy Commissioner Warns Against Their Use on the Farm.

The latest Bulletin sent out from the office of J. D. Mickle, state dairy and food commissioner contains the following on the subject of commercial feed, of interest to all farmers.

The legislature of 1913 passed a law prohibiting the sale of concentrated commercial stock food unless the same be so labeled that the purchaser may know exactly what the contents are and what the feeding value is. This law was necessary for the reason that many different mixed

a very wide range running from nothing in several cases to as high as 50 mills in the case of district number 56. The Bend school district tax is several times more than that of most other districts, amounting to over \$20,000 as against about \$10,000 in the case of district number 1, the next highest.

REGISTER NOW AND MAKE THINGS EASIER ON ELECTION DAY.

Inclined to pay more money for manufactured feeds that have some fancy name and which contains the same feed value as that which they have at home. Last week a man came to our office for information regarding some feed analysis which are on file. After the investigation he found that he had been paying 12 per cent more for dried best pulp than the quotation for home grown barley. Barley contains about 20 per cent more total nutriment. He had been paying \$22 per ton for alfalfa meal that contains perhaps 6 per cent more nutriment than clover hay that sells in his own neighborhood for \$10. This is an example of extravagance that takes place on many farms when the stockmen and dairymen import at great expense such feeds as best pulp, alfalfa meal, New Orleans molasses, and many others that have some real food value.

Imagine then what takes place when a dealer confronts him with one or more of the hundreds of so-called "stock foods," "stock remedies" or "stock tonics" that are on the market, and the farmer reads the labels. "Tones up the system," "Prevents diseases," "Saves time in preparing for market," "Improves the condition of wool on sheep," "Swags will raise more and stronger pigs," "Dairy cows produce more butter," "Makes calves grow healthier," "Makes the meat of beef animals and hogs tender, more juicy and better eating," "Fattens cows, bulls, steers, calves and hogs, and makes them robust," "Makes hens lay."

So-called "stock foods" with the above allegations as to their food value, compare favorably with a mixture of grain and oilmeal that can be had for \$30.00 per ton. The highly lauded "stock foods" sell for \$28.00 to \$33.00 per ton, according to the prices at which they are retailed.

In the past many people were misled into believing that these "stock foods," "tonics" and "regulators" really had some magic power. They were fed and often good results noticed; which results were invariably credited to the fake mixture of oilmeal and what not, purchased at a price that pushed the manufacturer into the millionaire row. If the feeder's actions were carefully analyzed, other reasons for the improvement in his stock could be easily found. When a man begins to feed stuff that costs \$30.00 per ton to livestock, he does so with more than the usual degree of care and attention. Often many other changes in the animals' feed and care are made; these changes, with the aid of any ordinary physic, would effect the improvements and quite likely would have done so unassisted by the mysterious magic sold at the price of radium.
