cashier's check given in payment for them. This check was given the shipper, French, on the understanding that the cattle were all in good condition and he transferred it to his local bank. Thereafter, on ascertaining the condition of the animals, and at the request of the State Veterinarian, the local bank refused payment for which suit has now been brought.  
Speaking of the affair, C. S. Hudson, cashier of the First National Bank, said yesterday:  
"The State Veterinarian is to be complimented on the stand he has taken in this case, and it is a foregone conclusion that a local jury will protect, not only the people who purchased the cattle, but uphold the local bank. In its effort to protect the farmers against bringing in diseased cattle."  
"All the cattle now shipped from Illinois must be certified by Federal Authorities, owing to the many cases of diseased animals having been shipped into Oregon."
