If every one who now has their mail sent to Redmond would "set up and take notice" and at the same time take a few postals and a few minutes time having their mail changed we could soon show Uncle Sam that we are entitled to one and perhaps two R. F. D. routes right from our little office. There are a few instances where our people receive their mail from Prineville, this practice too will be abolished when we get our R. F. D.

Miss Gertrude H. Strabridge will leave for Seattle shortly.

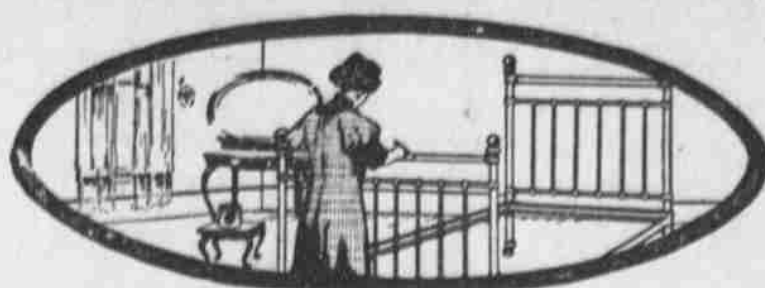
HAMPTON.
