BIG INVESTMENT IN WELL.
Substantial development of the homestead country to the southeast continues, and not only are more and more settlers taking up residence upon their lands, but the investment of capital on the homesteads is becoming larger each month.

A striking example of the way the homesteaders are taking hold of things is furnished by the purchase here last week of a large well outfit by John W. Black, who has a homestead 3 miles south of Hampton Butte. The well, when installed, will represent an outlay of at least \$1,000, and will be the largest in that territory. Its power is supplied by a six horsepower gasoline engine, which will pump through a four inch pipe, and the water will be used for irrigation.

In competition with Portland and other metropolitan houses a local firm, the Bend Hardware Company, was able to make this sale, indicating the firm hold Bend has upon the trade of its tributary country. Another homesteader who is well digging upon a large scale is Eugene Pinkus, of Iron Mountain; and there are a great many more who are sinking wells and investing heavily in the new country they have chosen for their homes.
