BAYLEY BEATEN BY 45 BALLOTS

KELLEY WINS RACE FOR SURVEYOR

First Woman Gets Nomination—Knox Beats Milner Easily and Jordan Sweeps Field, Nominated by Both Parties—Elkins Wins Out

The totals for Crook county officers, as given above, tell the story. The vote was very light, especially on the Democratic side.

In two nominations only was there any great amount of interest, that for commissioner and surveyor, both on the Republican ticket. The defeat of R. H. Bayley of Laidlaw by J. F. Blanchard of Prineville for Commissioner, by a vote of 640 to 645, secures the nomination of another east side man, whose election would fill every county office with residents of the eastern portion of Crook county.

The defeat of R. L. Brewster by H. A. Kelley for the surveyorship, was accomplished by 39 votes.

Mr. Bayley was well supported in west side precincts, with the exception of two, Central and Lava, which knifed the last representative of their own territory, but with such a small vote as to have no appreciable effect on the totals. Bend, La Pine, and Laidlaw did notably well for Bayley and Redmond and Sisters also turned out handsome majorities, although showing an appreciable adverse vote.

In all west side precincts a complimentary vote for Bayley was written on the Democratic ballots, totaling enough to offset Blanchard's lead and in this way, at least, indicating what the real vote would be at a general election where direct vote for any candidate is possible. In no case was the voting strength up to the registration, even in the few west side precincts where some work was done by Bayley's friends to get the vote out, and a rough comparison indicates that in some of the anti-Bayley east side precincts, where Blanchard was active, a larger proportional vote was polled.

Elkins, unopposed for the Republican nomination for sheriff, polled a good vote, while Knox of the Democratic ticket, defeated Milner of Madras, 496 to 377.

By defeating J. E. Adamson by 219 votes, Miss Claudia Wonderly of Prineville won the Republican nomination for clerk, and becomes the first woman nominated for a county office in Crook county. Her opponent is Warren Brown, Democrat and present incumbent, who received a fat vote and in the last two elections has polled more ballots than any

other candidate. With 728 votes, Brown led the Democratic ticket easily.

Ralph Jordan, the present treasurer, was accorded a pleasant endorsement, swamping John W. Morgan of Prineville by more than two to one, and getting the Democratic nomination to boot.

P. H. Poindexter, as usual, had the race for coroner all to himself and landed as the nominee of both parties.

BEND BOYS WIN SECOND PLACE IN COUNTY MEET

With Madras Third—Kelley Wins Fourteen Points for Bend.

Representatives of the Bend high school participated in Crook county track, field and declamatory contests at Redmond last Friday.

The Bend team consisted of Claude Kelley, John Steidl, Lloyd Gorton, Howard Young, James Corley, Everett Brandenburg, Verna Young and Margaret Thompson, the last named being the speaker for Bend in the declamatory contest.

First place in the meet was won by Prineville, second by Bend and third by Madras. Kelley of Bend, proved to be one of the best point getters in the county, winning a total of 14 points. The total score of the Bend team was 43 points.

This meet was inaugurated last year as an annual affair. This year the delegations from the various towns were larger than those of last year and the meet was generally more successful, thus assuring its continuance.

The program was extensive and varied, and in addition to many vocal numbers included violin solos by Mrs. West and piano solos by Miss Graves, who also accompanied the singers. Many of the songs were popular new ones, and several catchy humorous offerings were introduced. The house was nearly filled.

The Club, including thirteen women, has been practicing weekly for several months, and will now take a "vacation" until some summer entertainment is planned. Probably the quartet will appear at Redmond, as has been requested from there, and perhaps at Laidlaw.

WITHYCOMBE IS STATE'S CHOICE

SMITH IS DEMOCRATIC NOMINEE

Lewis Wins Handily from Stockman for State Engineer—Brown Endorsed By Republicans for Attorney General—Race Still On

Crook county returns, in every case but one, echoed the final totals of Oregon at large. The exception is the State Engineer, for John H. Lewis, who was easily nominated, was beaten in Crook county by Stockman, 428 to 673.

Dr. James Withycombe of Corvallis is the Republican nominee for governor, leading Moser by approximately 4,000 votes. In the county he won two to one, Crawford, who was second in Crook county, was third in the state. On the Democratic ticket Dr. C. J. Smith won over A. S. Bennett by about 1300 votes.

Lewis is the nominee for state engineer by a generous lead, and it is probable Stockman's name was written in the Democratic ticket enough to insure his nomination.

A close race is still on among the candidates for members of the Supreme court, Charles L. McNary, the present incumbent, apparently losing to Henry L. Benson of Klamath Falls by a very narrow margin. The vote of Benson's old county, Lake, practically decides the race. The other three nominees are McBride, Bean and Harris. In Crook county Bean led in votes, and, to the surprise of those who appreciated what McNary had done in aid of irrigation, he came out in fourth place.

George M. Brown of Douglas county wins handily over Frank Grant of Multnomah for attorney general, as he did here more than two to one. Hoff is labor commissioner nominee.

In this district V. A. Forbes of Bend and W. O. Smith of Klamath received large votes for state representatives, and on the Democratic ticket P. H. Dener of Bend polled 564.

N. J. Sinnott, unopposed, got 1621 Republican votes for congressman from this district, and it is pretty sure that the name of Sam Evans of Klamath Falls has been written in enough to insure his nomination on the Democratic ticket.

Booth, for Republican senator, received a big endorsement in the state at large and 1024 votes in Crook county, the highest number accorded any candidate, and Chamberlain was voted in handsomely throughout the state with 753 ballots in this county, the highest number given on the Democratic side.

In the Progressive ranks the returns from county and state were farcical. Only 28 votes were cast in Crook county, and in the state the highest figure was only 593 votes, with, however, a few more to be counted. On that ticket Gill is candidate for Governor, Moulton for congress and Hanley for the senate.
