 Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Ryan were in

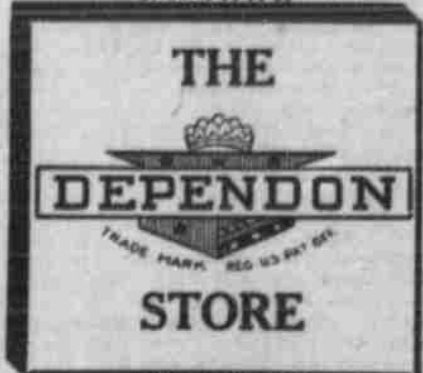
