

BUSY DAYS FOR FORESTRY MEN

SEVERAL CREWS NOW IN FIELD

Land Classification Work Being Done at Davis Lake and on West Fork of Deschutes—New Bridges are Built and Roads are Planned.

Activity of various sorts is just now engaging the attention of the Forest Service in this neighborhood, covering matters from land classification to bridge building, according to reports brought in by Supervisor M. L. Merritt, who returned on Thursday from a trip through the country to the south.

Up at Davis Lake a party of four under Ranger J. A. Brinkley is examining all open land along the lake shore with a view to classification, and a party of two under Ranger Carl are engaged in the same work on the meadow and low land for several miles up and down the river from the Wickiups ranger station.

On the north the telephone line has been finished from Allen's ranch to the Indian Reservation and the Allingham bridge will be finished this week. The Davis creek bridge is finished and ready for the heaviest traffic.

On this trip Mr. Merritt visited the crews in the field and then went down to Odell and Crescent Lakes on a sort of scouting tour to look for routes for future road building. He found a feasible route on which the cost of construction would be small and is hopeful of being able to begin on it soon.

The fire situation, according to Mr. Merritt, is greatly improved by the heavy rains that have fallen recently so that no danger of fire is expected for the next few weeks. Fire guards have been established already at the Paulina and Sisters ranger stations and later, when the ground has dried again, provisions for the whole forest for the coming summer will be made.

He wishes to know the size of the trout and the place where caught and asks for the co-operation of local fishermen in this matter.

MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, May 22.—Receipts for the week have been, Cattle 1053, calves 95, hogs 4188, sheep 5099. Livestock liquidation last week was somewhat lighter than for the same period a week ago, in all lines except hogs, which showed considerable increase. Cattle prices were steadier and further declines were not registered. Buyers gave \$7.50 to \$7.75 for best light bay fed steers, \$6.50 to \$6.75 for good cows and all other cattle prices were equally steady. The feature of the session was one load of firm grain fed steers Monday at 8 cents. Notwithstanding a liberal run of swine, prices held steady throughout. The best grades of light hogs selling at \$8.25 for tops. Outlet broader. Mutton receipts were smaller and mostly from Willamette valley points. Top on best grade valley yearlings \$5. Spring lambs sold Thursday at \$6 but showed further weakness at close of week's business. Ewes were the firmest class in the layout, selling steady \$4 to \$4.25.
