

WOULD ABOLISH PRESENT BOARD

SEEK SCALP OF JOHN H. LEWIS

Initiative Measure Fathored by Governor West Allegedly is for Economy and Would Change State Official Map—Salary is Fixed.

SALEM, June 6.—A copy of an initiative bill for the abolishment of the Desert Land Board and of the office of one of the state water commissioners, for the reduction of the salary of the state engineer, his office to be filled by appointment by the state land board, besides a number of other changes, was submitted to the secretary of state today by W. P. George of Salem for approval as to form. The measure, which covers the recommendations made by Governor West, is being initiated by Mr. George.

Governor West declares that the measure, if enacted into law, will cut the expenses of the Desert Land Board, state water board, and the state engineer's office in half. Appropriations for these departments by the last legislature amounted to \$10,000 for the Desert Land Board, \$40,000 for the state water board, and \$143,800 for the state engineer's office. The appropriations for the state engineer include the \$50,000 for the water power surveys, \$15,000 for Cello investigation and \$45,000 for topographic and hydrographic work.

Boards are Abolished. The proposed measure abolishes the Desert Land Board and transfers its powers and duties to the state land board. It abolishes the state water board, now comprised of the state engineer and the two commissioners, and the office of superintendent of water divisions, and assigns their powers and duties to a state water commissioner who shall be appointed by the state land board. It abolishes the office of state engineer, as now constituted, and provides for the appointment of an engineer by the state land board at a salary of \$2400. The present salary for that office is \$3000.

It is provided that until the year 1916 the engineer in charge of the construction of the Tumalo Irrigation Project, which work is being done by the state, shall perform the duties of the state engineer without additional salary, one half of his salary to be paid from the Tumalo funds and one half from the appropriation for the state engineer's office. O. Laugaard is the Tumalo project engineer, and the work on the project is expected to be completed by 1916.

Salary is Fixed. The state water commissioner, who is to be appointed by the state land board, is to receive a salary of \$2400 a year and perform the duties now assigned to the state water board. This would eliminate one water commissioner and a \$2400 salary. The measure also provides for the repeal of those sections of the code which carry a continuing appropriation of \$59,000 for the office of state engineer, and the state water board. This would make it necessary for the departments involved to go before each legislature for funds needed.
