LADIES EARN MANY DOLLARS

WORK FOR LIBRARY IS SUCCESSFUL

At Reception Yesterday Gratifying Results of Recent Campaign Announced—Debt is Greatly Reduced—List of Workers Given

As a result of the hard work done by the ladies of the Library Club, who started out about two months ago to raise cash through the "calendar system," the institution is the richer by about \$125, and the receipts are not yet all turned in.

The Club held a meeting and reception yesterday afternoon at the library, when the various ladies who had been making money in one way and another made their reports and turned in their cash. The total accounted for was \$121.35, which does not include the amounts made by various ladies who have as yet not reported, and several who desire to finish the work they have commenced before announcing the results.

Some 35 ladies attended the reception. Refreshments were served and the hostesses were Mrs. W. H. Staats, Mrs. Bert Shuey and Mrs. A. C. Lucas.

The treasurer reported a cash balance of \$49.04, after disbursements for the quarter of \$62.95. It was voted to devote \$100 of the amount received from the calendar work to partially liquidating the institutions only debt, amounting to \$170, thus placing the library in a most satisfactory condition, especially as a constant increase in its equipment and usefulness is being made.

The librarian reported 22 new cards received, 2219 visitors, 36 new cards issued, 1298 books loaned and 193 magazines loaned.
