CITY CLAIMS \$992.82

County Said to Owe this Amount on Old Road Taxes.

As the result of recent compilation of figures the city of Bend is discovered to be the creditor of Crook county for nearly \$1000 on account of road taxes and City Attorney Forbes is going to Prineville tomorrow to present the claim of the city to the County Court.

The exact amount claimed is \$992.82 and is 50 per cent of the road district tax levied in the years 1905 to 1910 before the adoption of the present city charter.

SETTLERS' MEETING URGES THE OPENING OF NEW ROAD

Bend Men Assist White Rock Ranchers in Their Effort to Obtain Better Connection With Town.

At a meeting held at L. E. Brandenberg's Saturday night, Bend men co-operated with ranchers of the White Rock section towards getting a new road opened up connecting that territory with Bend.

The proposed road branches off from the Bend-Laidlaw road near the Boyd place, and thence extends due north until it intersects the Laidlaw-Deschutes road, about midway between those towns, where it connects with the excellent road from that point northward.

BANK INCREASES SURPLUS

First National Makes Guy McReynolds Assistant Cashier.

FINISH BRINGING IN SHEEP

The Oregon Trunk has completed the movement from Coleman to Bend of the sheep bound for the summer range. In all 153 carloads have been brought in, making a total of 35,000 sheep that have passed through town in the past ten days.

RESERVOIR TO BE BUILT SOON

WATER COMPANY TO MAKE ADDITION

To Construct 100,000 Gallon Reservoir on Hill Above Kenwood—Will Cost Several Thousand Dollars—Work to Begin At Once.

Carrying out its settled policy of making provisions for the needs of the town in advance of its growth the Bend Water Light & Power Company will shortly begin the erection of a new reservoir more than three times the capacity of the present tank from which water for the town is now supplied.

The new reservoir will be situated on the hill above Kenwood on the west side of the river in the Bend View property. The site was acquired by the water company last year in anticipation of future needs but it is understood that at that time it was hardly expected to build so soon.

The cost of this addition to the company's plant will amount to several thousand dollars, much of which will be spent for labor.

CREAMERY MACHINERY HERE

Arrived on Monday and Will be Set up as Soon as Possible.

The machinery for the Central Oregon Farmers Creamery arrived on Monday and has been unloaded preparatory to being moved to the quarters in the ice plant of the Bend Water Light & Power Company.

H. J. Morgenstern, the buttermaker employed by the directors of the company, returned to town from Lake on Monday. He will oversee the setting up of the machinery and expects to have the business in operation soon.
