

ALFALFA LOST IN BASEBALL

16 TO 4 IS THE SCORE SATURDAY

Plenty of Errors in July Fourth Game—Kulp Again Shows Up as Pitcher—Fast Double Play in Feature, Cleaning up an Inning.

The Fourth of July baseball game with Alfalfa resulted in a victory for Bend, 16 to 4. It was a ragged game but with plenty of fun for the spectators, and everyone in the large crowd seemed to enjoy the exhibition hugely.

That Bend scored 16 tallies on 10 hits indicates that the opposing fielding wasn't exactly perfect, but so far as recorded errors go, the two teams broke even, each with 11.

Morse, from the Tumalo Project, pitched half the game and came far from living up to the reputation that preceded him. His delivery was batted freely, and out of four times up he failed to get a hit. "Iron Man" Kulp, who did the mound work the latter portion of the game, had an easy time with the batters, and got a couple of hits to boot. Barnes, the Alfalfa pitcher, pitched a very fair game but had ragged support.

Bend's biggest bulls were made on kindergarten base running, three men being caught in attempted steals of third base, one of them trying a miracle in this line when no one was out. While Johnson, the third baseman, made four errors, at least two of them were on very difficult balls. However, his batting average was zero.

The sluggers of the Bend team were Stover and Sproat, the former connecting with the ball twice for three sacks, and the latter, deemed very sure with the stick, making three clean singles, which brought in runs each time. Both hitters, however, appear prominently in the error column.

The Bend team exhibited its best ball with three Alfalfa men on the bases. A swift grounder was scooped up by Stover, who made a perfect throw home, and Van Matre, the star backstop of the home team, repeated the action, getting the man on third for a double, ending the inning.

WATER SPORTS ON FOURTH MAKE HIT WITH THE CROWD

Canoe Tilting and Log Rolling on River Prove Popular Features of Celebration—Setting is Perfect.

Of all the attractions of the Fourth what seemed to give the crowd most enjoyment was the water sports. At about five o'clock, when all the other events were over, the people gathered on the lawn and along the rocks looking down on the river in front of the Emblem Club and laughed and applauded while the contestants did their stunts and tumbled into the water.

Certainly no more beautiful place for such entertainment could be devised; the water was blue and clear, across the river rose the picturesque pines, and behind the snow covered mountains was a gorgeous sunset sky. Bend alone of Central Oregon towns can offer such entertainment and with such a setting, and it was universally agreed by local folk and visitors that in the future much more fun on the water will be most desirable.

First was the canoe tilting. "Dutch" Stover was "tilter" in one canoe, with W. J. Sproat paddling. The other crew had Jack Rudell in the bow and R. W. Sawyer wielding the paddle. At the very first encounter Rudell lost his balance and over went his canoe. On the next trial Sawyer handled the tilting pole, while Rudell took the paddle, and this time it was Stover who got the worst of the sparring and he and Sproat went into the water.

Then Steve Steldt and Tom Hendrix gave a first class exhibition of log rolling, which, after a game encounter left Steve on the log and Hendrix in the water. Next Stover climbed on with Steve and was speedily ducked.

With Norval Springer Pitching Good Game Alfalfa is Defeated by 11 to 0 Score—Stover Gets a Near-Home Run—Caught at Plate.

Sunday's ball game was presented to Bend on a silver platter, embossed with errors and trimmed with hits. It was, in short, a merry-go-round, and a whole lot of fun to boot. When the dust cleared the tally-card showed eleven runs for Bend and none for Alfalfa.

The afternoon developed several heroes and near-heroes. At the top of the hero list stands Mont O'Donnell, who "came back" last week and showed that he is still back. The old vet caught a fine game, of course—he always does that. Twice he pegged would-be base-pilferers out at second, and out of four times at bat he garnered three hits, which is some batting average. But the real miracle came when Mont got on the sacks, for the old leaguer made one of the young bucks look like a lead nicker when it came to base running; for Mont stole second three times—the best record of the day—and then stole third. Later he tried to steal home, just to show it could be done, but he got nabbed at the plate.

Hunter is left field made a star running catch and Dutch Stover laced the ball into the right garden for a three bagger, giving him three triplets in two games. However, Dutch tried for a home run and was thrown
