STREET EVENTS DRAW CROWDS

CLOSE FINISHES ARE THE RULE

Laidlaw Athletes Take Many Prizes, the Hunnell and the Marsh Families Leading All Others—Gressed Pig Gives Much Amusement.

Good natured rivalry marked the athletic events held on the streets on the afternoon of the Fourth. Competitors in the different races stepped out of the crowd, took off their coats (except in the case of the ladies) and sometimes their shoes, (no exception here) ran their distance and returned to watch the others.

Although the shoot was going on at the same time, a big crowd filled the streets, packing in around the finish lines and sometimes blocking the path of the racers. This tendency to push in gave one young man a pretty spill when a fair runner, intent on winning the baby carriage event, ran into him hard.

Close finishes marked nearly every race. In the 100 yard dash only a few inches separated Steve Steidl, who won and Lloyd Harader, who took second place. In the baby carriage race, too, it would have been difficult for anyone not right at the tape to name the winner. This and the ladies' 50 yard event aroused so much interest in the crowd that a special purse was put up on the ground for a race between the ladies, being won by Mrs. F. A. Hunnell.

As was expected the gressed pig furnished the most amusement for the crowd. A very active little fellow, donated by J. S. Stanley, and thoroughly gressed for the occasion, led his pursuers a merry chase until Charles Buzell made a foot ball dive and grabbed the pig by the hind leg. J. J. Klein, J. L. Cody and G. W. Arnold acted as judges at the finish and J. A. Eastes as starter.
