THE COUNTY DIVISION.

"How will it affect taxes?" is the first question the voter will ask on having the county division proposition put up to him. There is only one answer. It depends on the character of the officials who administer the county affairs.

Crook county is too large for efficient and economical administration. The interests of the different sections are opposed. What one wants another fights against. There is no unanimity and no common purpose to achieve.

The remedy for this state of affairs is plain and it is the one which is now being sought. That this is realized by the residents of the north end is shown by the way they have come out in support of their division petition.

With the proper officials that will be the result in Deschutes county. Salaries must be paid that will, of course, to an extent, be a duplication of salaries paid in Prineville.

To take a specific instance: One term of the circuit court in Prineville last year cost \$5,063.55. Of this \$4,972.50 went for juror and witness fees and mileage. Another term cost \$2,172.75 of which \$2,107.40 was juror and witness fees and mileage.

That has been done elsewhere in Oregon. Before the present Sherman county cut off it was paying a 20 mill general fund tax and a \$3 poll tax. For the past 10 years the general fund tax in Sherman county has averaged 9.6 mills.
