BUILDING A RAILROAD?

I. W. Gray, Redmond agent for the Oregon & Washington Colonization Co., and the Redmond papers are building a railroad from Redmond to Sisters across the Cascades to connect with the Oregon Electric at Jefferson. We trust that they are right and have little doubt but that the road would be built within a short time if the distance was no greater than 50 miles as stated in the articles published. It is 110 miles from Sisters to Albany and Jefferson is several miles north which added to the 22 miles from Sisters to Redmond makes the distance almost three times as far as Mr. Gray's estimate.

will be made. Preparation of the petition was completed yesterday and a large number of signers has already been secured.

The County Division Law.
 Under the county division law, passed by the legislature in 1913, the question of the formation of a new county out of an existing county is placed on the ballot by the county court on the receipt of a petition signed by a majority of the legal voters living in the territory affected by the change. To carry, the proposal must be favored by 65 per cent of the voters in the new county and 35 per cent of those living in the old county. Under an opinion rendered by Attorney General Crawford the 35 per cent necessary for Deschutes county will be counted in the proposed Jefferson county and what is left of Crook county, and vice versa. Jefferson's 35 per cent will be counted in Deschutes and old Crook, the idea being that until the result of the vote is known all outside the new county is "remainder of the county" within the meaning of the statute under which the division is made.

If the new county is formed the county judge and two commissioners will be appointed by the governor and they will select a temporary county seat and appoint all other county officers.
