

# DISTRICT NO. 12 AND CITY GAIN

## COUNTY OWES BOTH ON TAXES

Investigation Shows that Bend School District Has Not Been Paid Some \$1500 Due It From Old Taxes—City also to Benefit by Finding

PRINEVILLE, June 20.—As a result of the examination of county records by Max Crandall, expert accountant, who has been sent here by the City of Bend and by School District No. 12, it appears that an even greater amount of money will be forthcoming for the territory he represents than was at first supposed. At least, a preliminary statement, sent to his employers by Mr. Crandall, shows that an amount in excess of the \$992, claimed on road tax is apparently due the city, while the District seems to have about \$1500 coming to it.

The figures are not complete as yet but Mr. Crandall's preliminary report—which will be presented in detail in a few days—is to this effect:

There is due to the city (aside from the road tax money) the following for the years listed:

1905 tax roll	\$ 51.47
1906 tax roll	62.81
1907 tax roll	37.38
1911 tax roll	150.17
1912 tax roll	62.53

There is also a tax of about \$145 due the city for 1912 from the Oregon Trunk Railway, which was not extended on the rolls.

There is due to District No. 12, according to Mr. Crandall's preliminary findings, amounts as follows:

1912 tax roll	\$639.09
1911 tax roll	121.90
1910 tax roll	122.65
1905 tax roll	51.47
1906 tax roll	534.20

Total \$1468.33

The city of Prineville has now received from the county \$1694, due it through oversight in old accounting. These amounts are sums that actually have been collected but not credited to District No. 12. There is also a couple of hundred dollars for others, but details of these claims have not as yet been worked out.

who have been the financial backbone of Crook county, of this affliction. Since Bend has existed Crook county finances has been the base for political intrigue and manipulation. "The old settled and developed portions of the county have been mulcted of the funds justly due them through one pretext or another. Men who have gone through all the hardships of real pioneers, who have acquired their holdings by "roughing it", who have raised their families under conditions having but few pleasures but under surroundings conducive of hardihood, have seen the money paid in by them for legitimate government purposes lavishly expended for the sole benefit of a few real estate speculators or the pleasure of the office seekers.

"It is little wonder then that this group of our citizenship are anxious for dissolution.

"On the other hand there is a considerable number of people in the proposed "Deschutes county" who are opposed to county division. They claim that county division will mean a greatly increased taxation, and we believe they are right in their calculations, especially as to the new counties, while Crook county can retrench somewhat on its expenses the expenses of the new counties will necessarily be three times as great for several years to come.

"Some of the residents of Redmond have said to us:

"We would favor county division if they had put the boundary three or four miles farther west and left Redmond in Crook county, but we shall fight county division as now proposed."

"The people in the vicinity of Hay Creek and Willow Creek are reported as not favoring county division at this time. Redmond and Prineville are divided. Paulina county is largely in favor of division while Bend will solidly support it, according to reports received, and so it goes. What is one section's gain may mean another's loss.

"It is a long time yet until election day and time and argument may change many opinions. The News will endeavor to voice the opinions of as many as possible and thus present the matter so each may reach his own conclusions."

On Saturday L. H. Irving of Madras and O. C. Young of Culver, prominent in the Jefferson county division movement, were in town to discuss the campaign with local men, and both made addresses at the noon luncheon of the Commercial Club.

Mr. Irving spoke of the condition which the Jefferson county workers had encountered when they first went out with their petitions in respect to the fear held by many that division would increase taxes. To show that this need not be necessarily so he called attention to the taxation figures for the past seven years as follows:

reasonable, he asked, to believe that smaller counties could be maintained for something like that figure rather than a multiple of the figure for 1913? He also called attention to the figures on taxation in Sherman county. There, he said, before that county separated from Wasco, the people were paying a 20 mill tax and a \$2 poll tax. In the 10 years following the separation their average tax was 9.5 mills and for the past few years 3 mills of that was a special tax levied for road purposes.

Mr. Young followed Mr. Irving with a statement of the feeling in the north end on the subject and a plea for united effort on all sides to bring about victory in November. He called attention to the differing interests of the three sections of Crook county and pointed out that harmony

and united effort were impossible as things now are and that the proposed split would benefit the old county and the two new ones. Following Mr. Young a number of local men spoke each one urging the necessity of hard work in the campaign.

### Maps to Show Lines.

In order to show the lines of the new counties the local committee is having prepared small maps of the present county with the new boundaries set down. These will be distributed in the different sections of the county wherever petitions are left for signing. In the meantime every voter is urged to sign the petition, or, if he has doubts as to the matter, to call upon some member of the committee to go over the proposition with him, and inform himself so as to deal intelligently with it.
