

FIRE DANGER IS GREATEST NOW

WOODS ARE DRIEST IN YEARS

Opening of Hunting Season Also Adds To Risk—Fires So Far Have Been Easily Controlled—Lightning Is Direct Cause of Six Fires

With the whole country drier now than for many years previous the danger of forest fires all over the state is looked upon as unusually great and extra precautions are being taken by government forestry officials and private timber owners to reduce the fire loss to a minimum.

So far as fire danger is concerned the east side of the mountains has a decided advantage over the west because of the open nature of the timber, the complete system of fire look outs and guards and the comparative ease with which any affected territory is reached.

Up to the time of the last reports made to the local forestry office there had been 19 fires in the forest reserves of this section, burning 100 acres of timber, and five in private lands, covering 462 acres.

On Monday six small fires were reported from Sisters started by lightning in Sunday night's storm. A fire on the desert east of Pine mountains, which burned over 400 acres of sage brush and just touched the forest reserve, was also reported.

Locally the government, state and private patrols have been co-operating in the fire work to which can be attributed its success up to the present time. The telephone service, which has been greatly improved during the past year is also proving a marked factor in protection work.

Speaking of the situation on Monday Supervisor Merritt of the Deschutes Forest urged that all hunters be extremely careful in the existing dry conditions of the forest and asked, if fires are found too large for them to put out, that they notify the nearest forest officer at once.

MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, July 31.—Receipts for the week have been, cattle 1815, calves 93, hogs 2865, sheep 5633. Cattle liquidation heavier than last week, but outlet so good that beef prices gained a quarter. Top steer sales the first half of the week \$7.50, cows \$6.35, bulls \$5.74 head of exceptionally fine steers sold Friday at 8 cents. Improved demand and better trend to market. Swine receipts assumed fairly large proportions Monday. Trade reaches \$8.95 for best light stock. Tuesday and Wednesday \$8 and closing at \$9.05 Friday. This market can readily handle a few thousand more hogs than the present receipts. Choice mutton and lamb stock steady, at unchanged prices. The bulk of stuff, arriving for the week, of inferior quality. Receipts in excess of 5000. Prime wethers \$4.50 to \$4.75. Prime ewes \$3.85 to \$4, medium ewes \$3.25 to \$3.75. Spring lambs \$5.50 to \$6.
