

CIRCULAR SENT WATER USERS

DIRECTORS WANT A VOTE TAKEN

Action is Taken Following Meeting in Bend on July 25—Circular Says Company is Dissipating its Assets to Injury of Water Users.

Following the meeting of the members of the C. O. I. Water Users Association in Bend July 25th the directors of the association met with their counsel at Redmond to consider the form of action to be taken against the company.

To obtain the opinion of the water users on the subject the directors have sent to each one a circular with detachable slip on which an expression of opinion is asked. At the request of the directors the notice is printed herewith. Copies have been left with the following: J. A. Eastes, Bend; B. A. Kendall, Redmond; Geo. L. Beckman, Powell Butte, and H. N. Elliott, Terrebonne. All water users are urged to sign the circular, which is as follows:

Notice to Water Users.

Redmond, Ore., Aug. 1, 1914.

It has been brought to the attention of the Board of Directors of the Central Oregon Irrigation Co. Water Users' Association that the Central Oregon Irrigation Co. is dissipating the assets of the company, to the irreparable injury of every water user, in the matter of collecting maintenance fees year after year and failing to expend said money so collected in the maintenance of the system, and in collecting purchase money notes for land from settlers and failing to apply said funds in enlarging said system so as to be sufficient to irrigate sold lands so that same can be patented.

Requests have been made to the board to take legal action against the company to protect the interests of the settlers in these respects, either by securing a receiver to protect said funds or a cancellation of the company contract, so that the settlers may control the system until such time as the system can be turned to agencies which will complete the system.

Before taking definite steps the board of directors desire an expression from every water user as to his attitude upon such action.

THE WEATHER FOR JULY

Some High Temperatures Recorded—Many Clear Days—None Cloudy

July set a new record for temperature both for this year and as compared with the same month last year. Twice, on the 2nd and on the 18th, the mercury went up to 93 degrees, and on several other dates it was over 90, according to the thermometer at the local weather station. The lowest temperature recorded was 31 degrees on the night of the 21st. The mean maximum for the month was 87.3 degrees, the mean minimum 44.6 degrees and the mean 65.9.

Rain fell on five days, the total amount being .33 inches as compared with .55 inches for July, 1913. The greatest amount of precipitation in any 24 hours was .26 inches on the night of the 12th. There were no cloudy days during the month and only five that were partly so, the remaining 26 being clear.

CONVENIENCE AND COST SAME

AT LEAST IN MANY INSTANCES

Editor Young in Deschutes Valley Tribune Takes Up the Argument Suggested by the Crook County Journal—Division Desirable.

Carrying out the idea of the Crook County Journal that county division is a question of convenience and cost the Deschutes Valley Tribune in its latest issue argues that in many instances convenience and cost are the same thing. The article is as follows:

The Cost.

"The Crook County Journal looks the matter of county division squarely in the face, and urges upon the voters to consider the matter from a logical business standpoint. It says that the question resolves itself into two elements—that of convenience and of cost. The question of convenience is conceded, so that in the estimation of that paper the question centers about cost.

Conceding that the creating of new counties would be more convenient, and centering the discussion about the cost rather simplifies the matter, as the cost to a large extent is intimately connected with the question of convenience. For instance it has been suggested many times that the county be divided into three road districts, each district to be administered by a man appointed for that purpose. It has been rather the unanimous idea that this would be a good thing. Why? Simply because it would be so much more convenient, and because it has been realized beyond any question of doubt that the present county is so large that the county court can not properly administer the road affairs. That convenience is naturally connected with the question of cost, and very intimately connected. Because the very convenience immediately suggests the saving of money. In fact, the convenience largely resolves itself into a question of cost. It was suggested that a man be placed over one-third of the county to look after the roads, BECAUSE he would be intimately in touch with the road situation, therefore saving of county funds; that he would not have to travel such great distances, therefore saving of funds; that he could superintend construction better, therefore saving etc., etc. So the question of convenience runs into one of cost.

"The question of distance to the county seat is a question of convenience and it is also a question of cost—the one goes with the other. The establishing of new county seats will shorten the distance to the court house for the majority of the citizens of the present county. Thousands of dollars will be saved by the individuals, and the personal expense should be considered as well as the direct taxes. The great expense of mileage in all county affairs will be greatly reduced. It might seem upon first thought that each new county would have its proportionate share of the old mileage account, but further figuring will show that it will be reduced to a marked extent. It has been repeatedly shown that the county was administered some half dozen years ago for less money than any of the proposed new counties would yield in taxes at the present rate. But the big saving in cost would be because of the harmony of the new counties. Not that the new counties would be paradises with ne'er a strife, but anyone who has studied conditions in this country for

the past several years cannot fail to realize that there has been continual dissatisfaction because of improvements in other portions, each district imagining that it hasn't received its share of improvement. This condition shows conclusively that there is no interest in common, else the improvement in one portion would be considered to be of benefit to the other. The county is too large to have this community interest in all public improvement. The dissatisfaction and strife resulting from this condition is always expensive, and reduces the efficiency of government. It is costly, and a reduction of that sort of strife means a saving in cost. It is convenient to have harmony and it is also saves expense. We might go down the line of conveniences, and we would find them to be convenient because of saving of cost, or at least cost intimately connected with the question of convenience."

New Life in Movement.

According to the Madras Pioneer, the movement for the creation of Deschutes county has given new enthusiasm to the Jefferson county workers. In its issue of July 20, it says: "With the announcement that the people of the southeastern part of Crook county are intending to go out after a new county for their section on lines that meets those of the proposed Jefferson county squarely, much new enthusiasm is being felt all over this section and the work is being prosecuted with renewed energy."

"It was thought when the movement was started that all petitions would have to be filed with the county clerk by the first of August, but on recent examination of the law it seems that they do not have to be filed only a reasonable time before the meeting of the County Court in September."

"This will enable both the proposed Jefferson and Deschutes counties ample time to secure their full amount and more of signatures required to place the measure on the ballot for the fall election."
