This work is of immediate importance since the State officials, who are constructing the Tumalo Irrigation Project, pect to divert the waters of Crater Creek into Tumalo Creek and consequently are interested in the construction of the road. At present A. J. Welton, of the Tumalo Project, is working with a crew of eleven men opening up the right-of-way so that they can freight in their necessary supplies. Mr. Welton is doing his work along the line selected by Ranger Vincent so that whatever work they may do will benefit the Forest

Continued dry weather, following an extremely dangerous situation. Already 24 fires have been reported, 19 on and 5 off the Forest. Thanks, however, to a vigilant lookout system, and prompt action on the part of the field men, all of these were extinguished before they had done serious damage, with one exception This fire, which occurred just outside the National Forest boundary in section 13, T. 22 S., R. 11 E., was re-ported to and placed under control Ranger Curl on July 25, while still small. The next day it was left in charge of a man employed by private timber patrol interests, who evidently did not go near it. At any rate the fire broke out again on July and by night had covered about 450 acres. It was again promptly placed under control by Ranger Curl and carefully watched. This single instance emphasizes the necessity of carefully watching fires even after they are apparently safe.

Thirteen ranger stations, having an area of 1,550 acres, are held on the Paulina and thirty-one stations with 4,225 acres on the Deschutes. Of these, nineteen on the Deschutes. and eight on the Paulina are actually being used this season.
The total cost of improvements ac-

cording to our cost records is \$14-18.13 for the Deschutes, \$4,726.61 for the Paulina, a total of \$18.074.74. interesting in connection with the cost of improvements is the fact that the 117 % miles of telephone line on the Deschutes were erected at an average cost of \$40.46 per mile and the 33 % miles on the Paulina at an average cost of \$45.52. This cost includes supervision, cost of Forest officer's labor, value of co-operation,

Our timber sale work is one of the smallest Items in our Forest activities, only about 65,510 feet having been cut under Regulation S-9 sales and 20,460 feet under regular commercial sales on both forests. This amount was distributed through 24 different sales.

At present there are 29 special use permits in force on the Deschutes and 14 on the Paulina.

The elimination made March 12 reduced the area of the Deschutes 69.-306 geres and of the Deschutes Division of the Paulina 136,465 acres

Ranger South has arranged with the people of Crescent to assist the Forest Service in cutting the roots from and straightening the road running west from Crescent toward Odell and Crescent Lakes.

#### MEXICO'S ROYAL GHOST.

Legend of the Rumbling Cave of Las Siervas Hot Springs.

The hot springs of Las Siervas, near Vaile de Caulzos, in a remote part of the state of Guerrero, Mexico, have been visited by few people from the outside world, but they are famous in the legends and history of the Indian tribes of that part of the republic,

According to the natives, the waters of the springs possess great medicinal properties. In ancient times the springs were the favorite bathing resort of the noble families of the Tepaneca. Alcolhua and other tribes that lived in that region.

On both sides of the chief spring there are huge rocks with hieroglyphics and the figures of women beautifully carved. Judging from the robes worn by the women, their stately appearance and the jewels around their necks, the figures must represent princesses or ladies of very high runk.

The spring is at the entrance to a grotto that has never been explored. From the grotte a rumbling sound resembling distant thunder is to be heard all the time. According to natives, the rumble is caused by the ghost of King Excamina, who ruled over that part of the country three or four conturies before the Spanlards discovered America.
