

# HEMSTAD FOLKS DEDICATE HALL

**BIG DANCE GIVEN LAST  
FRIDAY**

Building Which is Erected Chiefly by  
Women of the Community is Scene  
of Pleasant Dance—Many At-  
tended from Neighborhood.

The new community hall in the Hemstad valley settlement was opened on Friday night with a dance attended by practically every settler to the neighborhood and by a large number from Imperial. An auto load went out from Bend to help dedicate the hall.

Hemstad valley lies south east of Millikan and to the east of Sand Springs. It comprises a large area to the south of the Pine mountain range and, although off the main course of travel has settled up well in the past three years.

The valley is named for Olaf Hemstad, the first settler, who took up his claim in November, 1911. The next one came in April, 1912, and since then settlement has reached the point in numbers and quality which has made possible the erection of the new hall and the giving of a dance such as that of Friday. The land on which the building stands was given by Mr. Hemstad.

The hall is 24x36 feet in size with a raised platform in a sort of bay on one side. It has plenty of windows and a matched floor which afford a fine dancing surface. As yet it is unseated. The most interesting thing about the hall, however, is the fact that it was built almost entirely by the women of the community. Their men folk sawed the timbers and the boards and helped a bit with the frame but every thing else, up to shingling the roof, was done by the women. The leading workers were Mrs. Peter Grabler, Kate Kasprovit, Mrs. John and Mrs. Carl Kleinfeldt, Hazel Nye, Mrs. E. Hubbard, Miss Fanny Stewart and Mrs. George Fogg. Mrs. Kleinfeldt, the 80 year old mother of the two Kleinfeldt boys, was also active in the work and did all the decorating with manzanita and mountain mahogany, which added much to the attractiveness of the hall on Friday.

About 50 attended the dance which continued until day break. Music was furnished by a cello and two violins. At midnight a supper was served. The hall will be used in part for a school building during the coming year, Miss Penny A. Stewart, a homesteader in the neighborhood having been engaged as teacher. An initial enrollment of about 30 pupils is expected.

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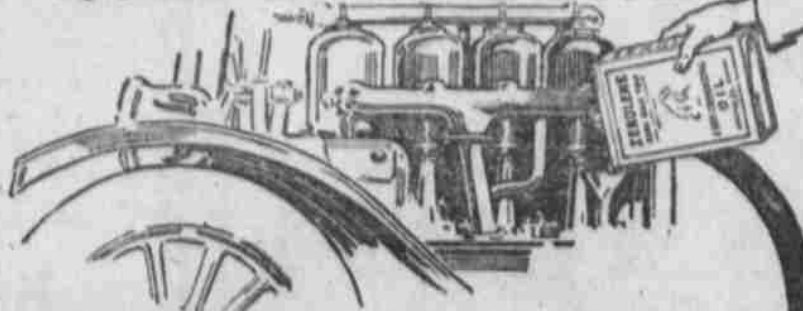
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
