

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

County Court of the State of Oregon,
For The County of Crook,
September Term, 1914.

A regular term of County Court for Crook county, Oregon, convened this second day of September, 1914, at the hour of ten o'clock, a. m., in the County court room, Prineville, Oregon.

Present, R. H. Bayley, Commissioner, Warren Brown, County Clerk, Frank Elkins, Sheriff. A quorum for the transaction of business not being present, Court adjourned.

Court convened at 9 o'clock this third day of September, 1914.

Present, R. H. Bayley, Commissioner, presiding, Willis Brown, Commissioner, Warren Brown, Clerk, Frank Elkins, Sheriff.

Whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of the telephone franchise to P. B. Johnson and R. Knudson.

Petition of P. B. Johnson and R. Knudson asking for a telephone franchise on county roads from the City of Bend to Millican, granted. (See written order.)

In the matter of wrongful assessment.

On petition of H. Hughes showing a wrongful and erroneous assessment of SW 1/4 of Section 26, Township 17 S., Range 13 E. W. M., Crook county, Oregon, order refund of taxes in the sum of \$12.26 for the year 1912.

In the matter of a permanent record of certain county roads.

On the request of George Millican showing that certain county roads are for the most part not a matter of record and are in danger of being fenced; order that the Surveyor be instructed to survey and file a record of said roads. (See request for description of roads.)

In the matter of the Crook County Fair Association.

In accordance with its appropriation of a former date, the Court orders a warrant drawn in favor of the Crook County Fair Association in the sum of \$1000.

In the matter of road district No. 5.

Order a warrant drawn in favor of Andrew Morrow, Supervisor of Road

District No. 9, in the sum of \$300.

In the matter of F. J. Rice, County Road.

On the petition of F. J. Rice et al showing that the F. J. Rice road is not a main trunk highway; ordered that said road be opened in a width of 40 feet instead of 60. (See order.)

In the matter of the Frank Irving change in the J. G. Edwards county road.

Final survey and report of Surveyor presented and approved. Clerk instructed to issue proper order opening said change as a public highway. (1913 law.)

In the matter of the change in the Tillman Reuter county road.

On the recommendation of the county surveyor in pursuance of a report from him at the request of this court. Resolution adopted recommending that the proposed change in the Tillman Reuter road be established as a public highway as a matter of public necessity and directing the report on same.

Report of county surveyor filed with court.

Ordered that the 4th day of November at the hour of 10 o'clock, a. m., be set as the date of hearing said report and that proper notice of said hearing be given according to law.

In the matter of the A. Aldridge county road.

This matter coming on for final hearing. Order continued indefinitely.

In the matter of the L. G. G. Smith change in the military county road.

On request of L. G. G. Smith and the recommendation of Supervisor of District 24. Resolution adopted recommending the adoption of the proposed L. G. G. Smith change in the military road as a public necessity and directing the Surveyor to make a report on the same forthwith.

In the matter of the R. Dykerhul change in the military road.

On request of R. Dykerhul and the recommendation of Supervisor of District 24. Resolution adopted recommending the adoption of the proposed Dykerhul change in the military road as a public necessity and directing the Surveyor to report forthwith on the same.

In the matter of the W. W. Brown county road.

Resolution adopted recommending the establishment of the W. W. Brown road as a public necessity and directing the surveyor to make a preliminary report on the same forthwith.

In the matter of the Wm. Blair change in the Don P. Rea road.

It appearing to this court that a former resolution has not been made a matter of record. Resolution is now adopted recommending the Wm. Blair change in the Don P. Rea road

as a public necessity and directing the Surveyor to report forthwith.

Preliminary report of county surveyor filed herein. Order November 4th, at the hour of 10 a. m., set as time of hearing said preliminary report; and that proper notices of said hearing be given according to law.

In the matter of Charles Lowther change in the J. G. Edwards road.

Resolution adopted recommending the adoption of the Charles Lowther change in the J. G. Edwards road as a public necessity and directing the surveyor to make a preliminary report forthwith.

In the matter of the extension of the Mill Creek county road.

Report of surveyor accepted showing that the full right of way has been secured by deeds and giving complete survey of road with field notes. Order that Clerk draw proper order opening same as a public highway according to report herein. (See deeds for right of way.)

In the matter of the Sherman Montgomery county road.

Hearing of Surveyor's final report, complete survey and field notes being filed herein. Order Clerk be instructed to issue proper order opening Sherman Montgomery road as a public highway according to the Surveyor's report. (1913 law.)

In the matter of the Ovid W. Riley road.

Viewers report read for first time. In the matter of the S. R. Forbes county road.

Viewers report read for first time. In the matter of the change in the H. B. Ford county road.

Report of Surveyor giving final survey and field notes coming on for final hearing. Order Clerk be instructed to issue proper order opening road as public highway under surveyor's report. (1913.)

In the matter of the J. A. Morris county road.

Viewers report read for first time. In the matter of the Joseph Street county road.

Viewer's report read for first time. In the matter of certain wrongful assessments.

In the matter of county aid funds. Report of C. S. Benson and H. C. Ellis on expenditures of certain county aid funds presented with proper vouchers showing a balance due said Benson and Ellis. Ordered that the Clerk be instructed to send each a lead pencil in full settlement of said account.

In the matter of Road District No. 6.

Bond of R. V. Jenkins, Supervisor of Road District No. 6 accepted in the sum of \$300.

In the matter of certain road warrants.

Ordered that the Clerk be instructed to draw certain warrants heretofore not entered on the docket as follows:

Report of P. T. Monroe, Supervisor of District No. 6 of work on Coleman-Ashwood road from April 1st to August 29th, 1914, showing balance on hand of \$725.66 received. Approved.

In the matter of the Culver Warehouse Company.

Application filed by Culver Warehouse Company for license to store grain in warehouse at Culver, Oregon. Court fixed bond in the sum of \$1000.00.

Ordered, That the Clerk be instructed to issue a warehouse license to the above company on the filing of a proper bond approved by the District Attorney in the sum of \$1000.

W. W. Brown road: Preliminary report of Surveyor favorable to the establishment of said road accepted. Order November 4th at hour of 10 a. m. set as date of hearing said report and proper notice thereof to be given according to law.

L. G. G. Smith change in military road: Preliminary report of Surveyor accepted. Order setting November 4th, 1914, at hour of 10 o'clock a. m. as date of hearing said report and proper notice thereof.

R. Dykerhul change in military road: Preliminary report of Surveyor accepted. Order setting November 4th, 1914, at hour of 10 o'clock a. m. as date of hearing said report and proper notice thereof.

Chas. Lowther change in J. G. Edwards road: Preliminary report of Surveyor accepted. Order setting November 4th, 1914 at hour of 10 o'clock a. m. as date of hearing said report and proper notice thereof.

Bleeding Kansas Still Bleeds!

To prove it, he went out and bought a keg of beer, two cases of bottled beer, a suitcase full of whiskey, and all the gin and wine he could carry.

That is what the Prohibitionists themselves tell us about Kansas.

Dry Kansas ranks 32nd in per capita bank resources.

Dry Kansas ranks 43rd in per capita savings bank deposits.

Dry Kansas has more inmates in her prisons in proportion to population than 24 other states.

Government statistics show that Dry Kansas has the lowest church enrollment of the North Central States. Only 28.4 per cent of her population is enrolled as church membership.

Dry Kansas buys great quantities of Bitters and Home Remedies. Government reports show these nostrums contain an average of 35 to 40 per cent alcohol.

Analysis of a favorite "nerve tonic" showed two grains of opium and 75 per cent of grain alcohol to each fluid ounce.

Patent medicines are always popular in dry states; above is the reason.

Do you, as a loyal Oregonian, want to see your state held up like this to the nation's scorn?

Records of County Clerks, Express Companies and Railroads in Kansas show that Kansas consumes just as much liquor under Prohibition as it did when it had legally licensed saloons. The state now gets no public revenue from this liquor. The "blind-pig" and the "boot-legger" have taken the place of the regulated saloon and ply their illicit trade in alleys and under cover of darkness.
