ENDORSEMENT GIVEN WILSON

CONGRESS REMAINS DEMOCRATIC

Uncle Joe Cannon Comes Back—Roger Sullivan Becomes Senator From Illinois—Walsh Re-Elected Governor of Mass., Johnson Cal.

President Wilson and his policies received the endorsement of the country in the congressional elections yesterday, both houses of congress remaining Democratic by substantial margins. Returns indicate that the present overwhelming Democratic majority in the House of Representatives is somewhat cut down but the party remains in control. For the first time in over 50 years a Democratic president will have a congress of his political faith during his whole term.

Outside the general result the most interesting feature of the national situation is the return to the House of Uncle Joe Cannon who went down to defeat in his Danville, Ill., district in the Democratic landslide of two years ago. Present indications give him a plurality of 1200. Roger Sullivan is probably next senator from Illinois having defeated Lawrence Y. Sherman, the present Republican incumbent. Other Democratic gains in Illinois are reported.

Democratic senators are also elected in North Carolina, Florida, Maryland, Indiana and Oregon, the victor being North Carolina, Overman re-elected, Florida, Fletcher, re-elected; Maryland, Smith, re-elected; Indiana, Shively, re-elected; Oregon, Chamberlain, re-elected. In Idaho Brady, Republican is leading Hawley and in Utah Reed Smoot is probably re-elected, though by a small margin.

In New York Glynn got a large majority in the city but lost heavily in the up-state vote and has been defeated by Whitman, Republican and the present district attorney. Bainbridge Colby, Progressive was a poor third. Latest returns show Gerard, the ambassador to Germany has lost to James M. Wadsworth, Republican candidate for the United States senate.

Massachusetts has re-elected Governor Walsh, the Progressives losing heavily as compared with last year's vote when Bird ran second. The Massachusetts delegation in Congress remains unchanged. On prohibition the latest returns show the drys leading in the state at large and the state may go dry.

Governor Johnson is re-elected by the Progressives of California. The Senatorial fight is close with Perkins apparently losing. The state is probably west, as in Washington.

Outside of Governor Baldwin, who is re-elected in Connecticut, the state officials are Republican by a big vote.

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KNOX WINS IN SHERIFF RACE

BROWN KEEPS PLACE AS CLERK

Wade Huston Has Lead For Surveyor—Warren Brown's Margin Over Miss Wonderly Is About 300—Jordan Polled Large Vote.

Frank Elkins, sheriff of Crook county, was beaten at the polls yesterday, despite a desperate campaign waged by himself and his friends. For the second time in his extended political career Mr. Elkins will be out of a job after the first of January but this time by a far more substantial majority than ousted him in 1910. Returns from all but 8 of the 48 precincts give E. B. Knox, his opponent, a lead of 326 votes.

Exclusive of the vote from Deschutes and South Bend precincts, both strongly against Elkins and both incomplete this afternoon, in the precincts enclosed in the boundaries of the proposed Deschutes county, Knox got 818 votes and Elkins 811. The incomplete returns from the Bend precincts at two o'clock added another 70 to the Knox lead.

While the county division issue probably defeated Elkins, most of whose Prineville intimates and deputies were actively against it, it probably has elected Wade Huston for surveyor. Huston was an out-and-out supporter of division. His chief opponent, Kelley, was prominent in the anti-division fight. Rice, the present incumbent, and an independent candidate, was a lame third.

Warren Brown continues as county clerk after January first. Incomplete returns from practically all the county give him a lead of practically 200 over Miss Claudia Wonderly. Friends of the latter expected a closer fight.

Ralph Jordan's vote for treasurer was probably the largest polled. Poindexter was returned as coroner, as usual.

FOOTBALL SATURDAY.
The Bend High School football team goes to Prineville this Saturday to play the county senators. A return game will be played here, probably on the 24th., during the Teachers Institute.

DIVISION BARELY DEFEATED HERE

OVER SIXTY PER CENT OF VOTES AFFECTED FAVORED SCHEME---JEFFERSON COUNTY CARRIED---TOTAL VOTE FOR DIVISION APPROXIMATELY 1519, AGAINST 955

The project to form Deschutes county from Crook county was defeated yesterday by a narrow margin, probably not fifty votes preventing the division. Calculating on totals based on an incomplete count in only three precincts, each of them three-fourths counted, division obtained about 61 per cent of the total vote of the question, instead of the 65 per cent required by the law. The estimated vote is 1519 for division and 955 against.

In the old county proper, that is, the portion of Crook not embraced in Jefferson, division got the required 35 per cent. The big vote in Jefferson county for Deschutes raised the total vote for the old county up to about fifty per cent.

Almost positively, Jefferson county carried. With but two precincts to be heard from the required 65 per cent is assured, with a margin of about 50 votes. It is not believed that the vote of the precincts in question can alter the outcome.

The solidest support for Deschutes division came from La Pine, Laidlaw, Millers, Imperial and Bend. La Pine produced 100 votes for division and only four against it. Redmond

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WITHYCOMBE IS NEXT GOVERNOR

CHAMBERLAIN AGAIN SENATOR

Sinnott Goes Back to Congress From This District—McArthur Defeats Flegel and Lafferty in Multnomah County—Wet and Dry Close.

PORTLAND, Nov. 4.—With the biggest vote in its history yesterday Oregon put a Republican in the governor's chair and returned her Democratic senator to Washington. James Withycombe was chosen governor by an overwhelming vote, his plurality being reckoned at not less than 30,000.

Senator Chamberlain will continue as Oregon's Senator. His plurality in Multnomah county alone is estimated at about 10,000 and it is possible that complete state returns will increase that lead. Booth ran badly. Even in such counties as Lane, Mt. Hood, and Hood River and Coos, where he was expected to be strong, he failed to poll a strong vote. Hanley proved a joke, getting probably not more than ten per cent of the vote cast.

Nick Sinnott of The Dalles, congressman from this district, was re-elected with no difficulty. Hawley is again congressman from his district and from Multnomah McArthur apparently has a safe lead over Flegel while Lafferty is a poor third. Prohibition seemingly has slightly the better of it, up to this afternoon. Multnomah went wet heavily but the state at large is predominatingly dry.

LIVESTOCK SHIPMENTS HEAVY

Recently 24 cars of Cattle and 200 of Sheep Have Left Bend.

"Bend is becoming one of the largest cattle shipping points in Oregon," says J. T. Hardy of the Oregon Trunk, in speaking of the recent heavy movement of livestock from here. Mr. Hardy points out that 205 cars containing 55,000 sheep, and 24 cars with 1000 head of cattle have left Bend during the last sixty days. There will also be shipped out later 25 cars more of sheep, to go to points in Washington, and about 10 cars of cattle, which will move to Arlington, Oregon, as feeders. A movement of cattle from the Silver Lake country this way is predicted.

SHOOT AT LAIDLAW.
The Tumalo Gun Club will hold a turkey shoot at Laidlaw this Sunday. There will be 100 Thanksgiving turkeys. The event is free for all and both rifles and shot guns will be used.
