Little Talks on Banking

Protest

A protest is an instrument drawn up by a notary public for the purpose of giving legal and formal notice, acceptable as evidence in court, of the nonpayment of a check, draft, note or bill of exchange.

In order to be legal this instrument must be attached to the dishonored paper and each endorser must be notified of the dishonor. The holder of dishonored paper, to protect himself, must give notice to all those he wishes to hold liable. If he notifies only one endorser it serves to hold that endorser and he, in turn, must notify any other endorsers

he wishes to hold. The ordinary custom in banks is to protest all items over \$10.00 that are dishonored unless there is a specific notice to the contrary. It is best for a customer leaving checks or other paper for collection to give the bank
