ANNOUNCEMENT OF RULES IS MADE

Plan is To Create Interest in Potato Growing Among Boys and Girls-All Between Ages of Ten and Nineteen Years are Eligible.

With the co-operation of the Extension Service of the Oregon Agricultural College,, the State Department of Education, and the United States Department of Agriculture, School Superintendent Myers is planning a Crock County Potato Ciub, open to boys and girls between the ages of 10 and 19. The plan of the club work is to interest the members in potato growing and to have them engage in the actual work of raising a crop of potatoes. Various prizes are to be offered for the leaders in the work. The rules governing the project are as follows:

1. MEMBERSHIP. Any boy or girl over 10 and under 19 on July day to the project are as follows:

1, 1915, who agrees to abide by all of the regulations governing the the regulations governing the project, is eligible.

2. PROJECT. Class A: Members shall grow at least 1 acre of potatoes. Class B: Members shall grow at leant % acre of potatoes.

Each member shall do all the work required for the preparation of the seed bed, planting, cultivating, har-vesting and in selecting his exhibit tubers. (Class B members may hire their ground plowed.)

FIRST DUTIES. (a) Euroll for the work, using the special enroll-ment cards obtainable from your lodistrict or county Club leader. When there is no local organization, anroll directly with the State Leader

(b) Rent the necessary amount of land from parent or neighbor for a period lasting until the crop is harvented.

(c) As soon as the land is secured agin preparing it, if necessary, for the spring planting.
