MADE A GOOD BEND RECORD

Coach Erskine Contributed to Success of Season-Many Stars Developed -Loss of Captain Vandevert Will

Be Felt By Team Next Year.

With the defeat of the Crock county high school team on November 24 the Bend high school eleven brought its season to a successful close. Out of four games played the team has won three, losing one closely contest-ed game to Prineville.

Much of the credit for the success of the season is due to the coach, Chas. W. Erskine. Mr. Erskine has had four year's experience in varsity foot ball, having played two years at half back and end on the University or Oregon team in the years 1907 and 1908, and two years at Willamette University, where he was regular half back in 1911 and 1912. Throughout the season Mr. Erskine has in-stilled upon the minds of his charges the two qualities that are so characteristic of the teams he played upon,

speed and a fighting spirit.
In developing the team the coach
was considerably handleapped by the lack of any scrub eleven against which to practice. With no oppo-nents the team had nothing to do dally beyond running through signals and it was impossible to work out any satisfactory defense. Nevertho-less in their games the players showed their football instinct and defended their goal with ability.

Every man on the team through-out the year played his level best, and although the whole team was not composed of stars, a marked improvement was shown by everyone as the season advanced. Right tackle was the position that gave Captain Vandevert and Coach Erskine the most worry until the last game when they persuaded Boyd, who had never come out for the team, to play. He showed his real worth in that game, being evident in almost every play.

The strength of the team was in the backfield, where the real stars were stationed. Kelley throughout was undoubtedly the most valuable man, especially in the last game, in which he scored three of the four touchdowns. He will be eligible for

the team next year.

As half back, J. Steidl and Captain

Arthur Vandevert were really exceptional for a team so green, as was will be in the high school next year. but all the supporters of the team will be sorry to learn that Captain Vandevert will graduate next spring and so be lost to the team another

Brandenburg at full back throughout the season fought like a buttdog, and from the results that came from his work, anybody could readily believe it. In the last Princville game he was probably the hardest fighter on the team.
