LANE ASKS APPROPRIATION.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Secrenent to Congress today, recommends an appropriation of \$450,000 "for Oregon's co-operative irrigation work." This is a reiteration of the stand recently taken by the Inter-ior Department that the state must put up \$450,000 in cash before the Government will make available its allotment of a like amount. (On its face this recommendation

is not necessarily a reiteration of the Department's stand. Passage of the appropriation by the Congress makes the money available after June 30, 1, 15. In the meantime Secretary Lane, can, if he wishes, make the allotment available at once.—Ed.)
