LANE ASKS APPROPRIATION.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Secretary Lane, in his annual estimates, sent to Congress today, recommends an appropriation of \$450,000 "for Oregon's co-operative irrigation work." This is a reiteration of the stand recently taken by the Interior Department that the state must put up \$450,000 in cash before the Government will make available its allotment of a like amount.
(On its face this recommendation is not necessarily a reiteration of the Department's stand. Passage of the appropriation by the Congress makes the money available after June 30, 1915. In the meantime Secretary Lane, can, if he wishes, make the allotment available at once.—Ed.)

JUDGE DELAYS LEVY MEETING

lar comparisons cannot be made except in the case of the high school levy which is reduced half a mill. The general school levy remains the same.

Last year 14 1/2 mills were levied for general county purposes and six mills for the state tax. This year the two are combined at 15 1/2 mills and there is an additional levy of 3 1/2 mills for road warrants.

Delegations Present.

Large delegations of taxpayers from various parts of the county were at the court house for the meeting in the forenoon. When the judges failed to show up many unpleasant things about him were said and at the opening of the afternoon session, with Springer presiding, George H. Russell went after him and demanded to know why he had not been present in the forenoon. Springer tried to side-step and urged that the budget be taken up but Mr. Russell was insistent and finally the judge said that he had lost a day of the week, and had been killing some hogs, and his man was sick, and a few things more, so he had forgotten. Mr. Russell asked if he would stand the expense of being sent for. The judge swallowed a couple of times and said he would. Then the budget was taken up.

The Budget.

In the discussion of the expense figures for the coming year it was apparent at once that the court had practically no information on the subject on which it was supposed to act. It had estimated 24 mills as the necessary amount for 1915 but did not know what the total assessed valuation of the county was nor the amount of the state tax payable by the county. Commissioner Bayley took almost no part in the proceedings and his successor, commissioner-elect Blanchard, was not present.

The items of the budget on which the most time was spent were those for roads, for the assessor and widow's pensions. Isaac Mills, George H. Russell, M. A. Lynch and others spoke in favor of increasing the amount set by the court for roads, some urging that it be put at \$50,000. Springer replied that he and Mr. Blanchard had talked the matter over and were satisfied that \$10,000 was all that the county should raise next year.

The discussion of the assessor's items resulted in cutting out \$3,000 that was to have been used for the census, in case one were taken. No change was made in the widow's pensions allowance. An interesting passage between the old and the new surveyor took place when the estimate for this office came up. Kelley stating that if the law were followed in certain ways over \$1000 could be saved.

No allowance having been made for the county agricultural representatives from Bend, Redmond and elsewhere urged that the appropriation be restored. According to the judge its omission from the budget was merely an oversight, but some of the large ranchers from the east end of the county spoke against restoring it. He did not hold of Prineville. A vote of the representatives about \$4 against the item and \$1 for. The court did not announce its decision.
