

THE NOVEMBER WEATHER

Month Shows Unusual Amount of Pleasant Days and Little Rain.

Contrary to the usual experience the weather during the month of November was unusually pleasant.

The highest temperature recorded was 70 degrees on the 2nd; the lowest, 18, on the nights of the 6th and 14th.

The greatest daily range was 43 degrees. For the month the mean maximum temperature was 56.1 degrees and the mean minimum 36.3 degrees, making the mean 41.5.

Clear days during November numbered 26, partly cloudy three and cloudy one.

The total precipitation was .16 inches of which more than half, or .09 fell on one day.
