Many recipes have been given for the curing of pork but I believe three of the best are given by Prof. Patterson of the Kansas Agricultural College.

PLAIN BALT PORK. Rub each piece of meat with fine, common salt and pack closely in a barrel, let stand over night. The next day weigh out brine until it is used.

BUGAR CURED HAMB AND BA-CON. Rub each piece of meat with salt and allow to drain over night, then pack closely in a barrel, hams out eight pounds of salt, two pounds erly smoked.
