

LOVETT OFFERS HELP IN BUYING

ORDERS QUANTITY OF FIELD PEAS

County Agriculturist Writes Farmers to Get in Their Seed Orders—Plans to Start a Farmers' Exchange to Assist Trading—No Charges.

County Agriculturist Lovett has addressed the following letter to the farmers of the county:

Dear Sir:—
"I am sure that you will agree that it will pay the farmers of this section to club their orders for seed for spring crops and believe that I can assist in getting the best seed for use here.

"In answer to my letter of November 26th, I have received orders for nearly one half carload of field peas for seed. If we can make this order for a full carload of field peas it will reduce the freight for all concerned and would suggest that you see as many neighbors as possible and make it a carload by January 20th. I have at present only about 200 farmers on my mailing list and you may be the only one in your neighborhood receiving these letters.

"If you care to join in a club order with us for sweet clover, dry land alfalfa, wheat, potatoes or other seed, kindly write me the kind and amount of seed you wish to purchase and I will try to get best seed at cheapest prices in large order for you and other farmers in the county.

"Sweet clover seed will cost about 20 to 30 cents delivered and should be planted in February or March. Plant 20 pounds per acre on irrigated land and 5 to 10 on dry land. "Dry land alfalfa will cost about \$1 per pound, should be planted about June 1st, and at the rate of 2 pounds per acre in rows.

"Am also taking orders for sulphate of potash for fertilizer. "I expect to start a farmers' exchange about January 15th, sending a list of crops, animals, etc., "for sale" or "wanted" to all those on my mailing list each month. If you have anything you wish to buy, sell or trade, notify me and I will put it on the exchange list. There will be no charges and I believe it will assist the farmers of the county in buying and selling their products, etc.

Uncle Sam Offers All Americans a Chance to Feed Starving Belgium

Arrangements Made For Sending Parcel Post Packages From Rural Districts. How to Aid the Stricken Little Sister of the World

FOR the first time in its history the postoffice department has been enlisted in a charitable undertaking. From this time forth any American who wishes to give food to the starving people of Belgium has only to stamp his parcel in the regular way and send it through the parcel post. It will go as straight and fast as rail and water will carry it to the doors of the starving Belgians, and the money he has paid for stamps will be refunded to the donor by the American Commission For Relief In Belgium, the executive offices of which are at 71 Broadway, New York city.

Seven million people, mostly women, children and old men, are still shut up in Belgium. Industry stopped when the Germans came; the money gave out through the payment of fines and indemnities; the crops were mainly ruined. With the coasts cut off, Belgium, which imports three-quarters of her food supply in normal times, could import no more. Work is gone; money is gone; most important of all, food is gone. The German conquerors, who need all their own supplies to guard against the proposed "siege of Germany" by the allies, cannot and will not feed them. The allies, fearing that the Germans will seize any food coming from a hostile source, cannot or will not feed them. America must feed them or they will starve. There is no other way. Seven million people, until last year the most industrious, peaceable and prosperous nation in Europe, will go to their graves this winter unless America gives as never nation gave before.

While Belgium needs everything, she needs most of all just food—non-perishable food which will stand the test of ocean transportation, such as flour of any kind, peas, beans and preserved meats. The donor has only to put up his gift in packages of not less than twenty-five pounds nor more than fifty pounds, stamp it in the usual way and mail it at the nearest postoffice. If the donor adds his own name and address, TOGETHER WITH THE LETTER "R," the money he has paid for stamps will be refunded to him by the commission.

Packages mailed from OREGON should be addressed to MUNICIPAL DOCK, INC., PORTLAND, who are collecting agents for this district.

CITY ORDINANCE.

An ordinance amending Ordinance No. 29 of the City of Bend, entitled: "An Ordinance to regulate the registry of dogs and to provide for the taking up, impounding and killing of dogs without license tags."
Be It Ordained by the Common Council of the City of Bend: Section 1.—That there shall be added to said Ordinance 29 the following provisions, to-wit:—It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police or other person whom the City Council of Bend may appoint as pound-master or dog catcher to shoot or cause to be shot or killed any un-muzzled dog, male or female, found running at large upon any street, alley or public place within the City of Bend after 12 o'clock m. January 25, 1915; provided however, that any non-resident of the City of Bend whose dog may accompany him within the corporate limits shall cause said dog to be led or tied in a safe manner and unless so led or tied, said dog shall be killed by the officials above designated.

Section 2.—It is hereby adjudged and declared by the Common Council of the City of Bend that existing conditions are such that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of public business, health and safety, owing to the great danger to person and property from

animals affected by rabies, commonly called hydrophobia; and this Council hereby declares that an emergency exists; that all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed and that this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage by the Common Council and approval by the Mayor.
