HOMESTEADERS ORGANIZE
Millican Valley Ranchers Arrange for Demonstration Farm.

MILICAN, Jan. 25.—About 50 homesteaders gathered at P. B. Johnson's Saturday, January 23, to organize a farmers' club. The officers of the new club are, A. D. Norton, president, P. B. Johnson, vice president, L. P. Rooney, secretary, Geo. Roberts, treasurer. The new club will be known as the "Homesteaders' Development Association."

A committee composed of P. B. Johnson, Wm. Spencer and Geo. Rogers was appointed to select a site for an experimental farm. The club will meet again next Saturday when a report will be made about the site selected. The tract will consist of 40 acres. The Bend Commercial Club has promised to furnish seed. At the meeting County Agriculturist Lovett gave a talk to the homesteaders, and advised them to plant dry land alfalfa, sweet clover and Marcus wheat. After the meeting refreshments were served by the ladies.
