B. Johnson's offer of 10 acres to be planted with Marcus wheat was accepted. Mr. Johnson will also enclose a smaller plot with rabbit wire which will be planted to sweet clover and alfalfa. Whatever the club decides to plant will be under instructions from County Agriculturist Lovett who expects to visit the plot once each month if possible. As it is the intention of the Association to have 40 acres in experimental crops, A. D. Norton offered 30 acres more which will be summer fallowed and put in to crop next fall by the Association. I. D. Owen, chairman of the committee, leading to the Paulina Forest and the other to Pine mountain. All settlers through whose lands these proposed roads will cross willingly gave a right of way. A committee was appointed to investigate the opening of the road from the Bend-Burns road north to Juniper hill. It was voted that each member pay a fee of 10 cents to cover incidental expenses. The next meeting of the club will be held on February 13th at Eric Hasteland's ranch.
