HEAD SENT TO PORTLAND.
What may prove to be the first case of rabies in Bend was observed in a small Spitz dog belonging to William Caldwell of the Bend building on Sunday. The dog's actions were such as to cause its owners to fear that it had been affected and they called on Chief of Police Roberts to shoot it. City Health Officer Coe sent the head of the dog to the State Board of Health in Portland for examination on Monday. If the case was far enough advanced examination will disclose rabies; a negative result, on the other hand, will not necessarily mean that the dog was not affected, but only that, if rabid, the disease had not progressed far enough to be found.
