ADVERTISING AND ROADS.

The discussion at the Commercial Club on Saturday on how to attract tourists to this section was like all debates in which the two forms of the question are not in opposition. One disputant argued that to get tourists here we must have good roads, another that we must advertise in the outside world.

The whole purpose of advertising is to attract, to turn people's attention to your goods, your service or whatever it is you have that you want them to spend money for.

Advertising is not all, however. Back of the advertisement must be a thing of value. The goods you advertise must be worth something if your advertising is to pay.

Susan B. Anthony said in 1878 that all the suffragists of all the states should "stand shoulder to shoulder against every party and politician not fully and unequivocally committed to 'Equal Rights for Women.'"

Some Democrats are objecting because Oregon's Republican governor has been given the power to remove subordinate officials. Had the situation been reversed and a Democrat been in the saddle, the critics would have been silent.

A FEW OF THE NEW STATUTES

PROHIBITION LAW IS MOST IMPORTANT

It Alone Worth Cost of Session, Says Withycombe—Tax Collecting Restored to Sheriffs—Time of Payment Changed—Other Laws.

SALEM, Feb. 27.—Now that Governor Withycombe has finally passed upon all bills which went through the recent legislature it is possible to view the work of the session as a whole and cast up the totals of results accomplished.

Undoubtedly the measure in which there was the greatest public interest was that putting into effect the prohibition amendment adopted at the November election. It permits the monthly importation of small quantities of liquor, makes consignee's receipts public orders and prohibits liquor advertising and the solicitation of orders.

The other statute of greatest general interest is the amendment of the laws relating to the time for the payment of taxes. An interpretation of the law is published elsewhere in this issue of The Bulletin.

Tax collecting was restored to the sheriffs from whom it was turned over to the county treasurers two years ago. By this law it is estimated that \$50,000 was saved the tax payers of the state since with their new work the treasurers were asking for more pay while there was no accompanying movement for the reduction in the salary of the sheriffs.

Stock counties are interested by the law providing that only bulls of recognized beef breeds shall be allowed on the range, while dairy sections are given assistance in the creamery competition law, making it unlawful for the big creamery companies to offer a low price for cream in one section and a high price in another.

Whether or not the referendum will be invoked against any of the new laws remains to be seen. If any it is believed that the prohibition bill may be referred. Provision was made for a special election in November in case any measures are to go to the people.

STUMPAGE IS LOW.

R. Z. Davis of Gist, who operates a sawmill in that section, has been in town recently. Mr. Davis reports that he has recently moved his sawmill into the forest reserve near the foot of Three Creek Butte.
