P. on a 24 hour schedule. \$170 per menth; according to Mr Kroemert's figures on the output of his mill, this amounts to 5 cents on a barrel of flour that costs you \$7.60 or to put it another way to manufature \$100 worth of flour will cost 65 cents for

the power.
"This shows how ridiculous all this fuse about power is and that the op-eration of the flour mill is not the real consideration of this franchise.

You might say that you are not interested in what the flour mill pays. This is one of the great mistakes of this whole business because the council is not supposed to be representing the flour mill or Foley or any other interest. You are here to do whatever is best for the public and the granting of this franchise would be distinctly antagonistic to the public
