DECISIONS OF THE COURTS
ON SUBSCRIPTIONS GIVEN

Subscribers Who Do Not Give Notice
of Intention to Discontinue Are
Considered as Wishing to Renew

Most readers of the newspapers
are not familiar with the laws gov-
erning subscriptions, says an ex-
change.
Here are the decisions of the United
States court on the subject:
"Subscribers who do not give ex-
press notice to the contrary are con-
sidered as wishing to renew their
subscriptions.
"If the subscribers order a discon-
tinuance of their publication the
publisher may continue to send them
until all dues are paid.
"If the subscriber refuses to take
periodicals from the post office to
which they are directed he is respon-
sible until he has settled his bill and
ordered the paper discontinued.
"If subscribers move to other
places without informing the publish-
er and the papers are sent to his
former address, the subscriber is held
responsible.
"The courts have held that refus-
ing to take periodicals from the post
office or removing and leaving them
uncollected is prima facie evidence
of intention to defraud.
"If subscribers pay in advance,
they are bound to give notice at the
end of that time if they do not wish
to continue taking the paper, other-
wise the subscriber is responsible un-
til express notice is sent to the pub-
lisher."
