Program of Annual Crook County Field Meet and Declamation Contest

The Annual Crook County Field Meet and Declamatory Contest will be held in Redmond Saturday, May 15, 1915. The events will be open to all public and high school pupils of Crook and Jefferson counties. It is the hope of the officials that pupils from every school in both counties will participate.

The citizens of Redmond intend to make this the gala day of the year. The Redmond school campus will be equipped with tables, free, for the use of those wishing to bring lunches. Coffee will be served free.

The program for the day will begin at 11 o'clock with a tennis contest consisting of boys' and girls' singles and doubles. Medals will be awarded the winners.

At the same hour a declamatory contest for the boys and girls of the public schools will be held at the Presbyterian church. One pupil from each school in Crook and Jefferson counties will be eligible for this contest. The selections must be limited to 750 words. The name of the contestant and the selection must be sent to Miss Edith Shaw, Redmond, not later than May 8. Medals will be awarded the winners.

There will be two divisions of the field and track events. One division will be for high school contestants and the other for public school pupils. Each division will be scored separately. A handsome trophy will be awarded the winning team of each division. Medals will be awarded the winners of each separate event.

It is urged that each high school send a tent and banner to Redmond one week before the meet. The tents will be erected for the private use of the schools sending them.

But one contestant from each school may enter for an event.

75 yard low hurdles.
Running high jump.
Running broad jump.
Pole vault.
One-half mile relay race.

A declamatory contest, consisting of dramatic, oratorical and humorous divisions will be held in the evening for high school girls. Each school is limited to two contestants, not more than one for any division. The selection must be limited to 1200 words. The names of the contestants and of the selections must be sent to Miss Edith Shaw not later than May 8. Medals will be awarded the winners.

We hope to receive entries from your school for a number of the events, and shall be glad to receive word from you soon, as the initial interest and encouragement are important factors in the success of this undertaking.

A light run of hogs this week brought the price up 10 cents with good quality offering. Prime light hogs are quoted at \$7.50. There is good demand for an increased offering in the hog section. The weather market took another jump upward this week when a nice load of wethers sprung the market a quarter. Prime lambs are bringing \$9.25 while a few spring lambs brought \$10.00. Market strong.
