

CONFLICTING LAWS MAY KEEP THE FAIR SEX FROM FISHING

Attorney General Will be Asked to Settle Question Raised by Clerk in Secretary of State's Office.

SALEM, April 20.—Women may be denied the right to fish and hunt in the state, according to the interpretation put here on two conflicting bills passed by the last legislature.

Under the act passed and filed with the secretary of state February 16, it is provided that it shall be unlawful for any male person to hunt and fish without a license, the intent of the measure being to allow women the right to hunt and fish without license.

In the section providing for the issuance of a license their issuance is restricted to males, and this latter act as a whole is construed as prohibiting all persons from fishing or hunting without license, and as barring women from obtaining a license.

FEDERAL AID SOUGHT

State Health Officer Seeks Help to Eradicate Coyote.

In a communication to the United States Biological Survey, Saturday, Dr. Calvin S. White, State Health Officer, urged that department to expend a portion of its available funds in exterminating the coyote in Eastern Oregon, which is doing such deadly work in the spreading of rabies.

"In order to put an end to the rabies our only hope is apparently in the eradicating of the coyote," said Dr. White in his communication. "The state has raised the bounty on coyotes to \$5 and the State Board of Health has been doing what it could in an educational way, but apparently the problem is too big for us to solve alone."

TIMBER SALE ANNOUNCED

Forest Service Announces Result of Klamath Forest Bids.

The district forester at Portland, Oregon, announced last week that the Pelican Bay Lumber Company of Klamath Falls, Oregon, were the successful bidders on the sale of the largest body of government timber ever advertised by the Forest Service in Washington or Oregon.

The sale includes two units, one of 85 million feet of yellow pine and other species on the west side of Klamath Lake, and a second unit of about 200 million feet of nearly pure yellow pine located just east of Crater National Park.

The Pelican Bay Lumber Company has been cutting National Forest timber for about four years. The company's mill was burned last summer, but it has been rebuilt and enlarged and is ready for immediate operation.
